DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Lummis Home stands on a sloping three acre tract located on the bank of the Arroyo Seco. The house (El Alisal") is a rambling 2-story random rubble stone masonry and concrete stucture. The exterior walls from 2' to 4' thick rest on deep concrete footings and are of riverbed boulders laid up in cement, lime and sand mortar. The sloping roof is covered with wood shingles or shakes. The house, containing some 14 rooms, was started in 1897 and built over a period of 15 years by Charles Lummis. In structural problems he consulted with two California architects, Sumner Hunt and Arthur Benton. Construction work was done by Lummis and a few Indian laborers. The building does not meet the present day requirements of the Los Angeles City Building Code. Occupancy is limited by safety code restrictions.
