

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Brunswick Hotel is a two-story, triangular-shaped building located on a triangular-shaped city block at the north end of the Missoula central business district, on the south side of the old Northern Pacific railroad tracks. The length of the building runs in a east-west direction parallel to the tracks. The hotel is painted stretcher bond, low-fire brick. It features a clipped corner, a flat roof with a dentilated cornice, seven northside bays, two westside bays, six southside bays, all separated by brick pilasters and a mortar-covered, stone foundation.

The cornice is four-tiered stretcher bond brick with brick dentilation. The upstairs windows are narrow with two-tiered header relief arches with sandstone sills. The windows are wood frame, double-hung, one-over-one. The windows on the south side of the building have been infilled with brick. There is an arched, wood frame, double-hung, one-over-one window located at the building's southwest corner. A wood frame balcony with diagonal support braces and a metal railing is located on the second level at that corner.

The first floor has a northwest corner entryway, a southwest corner fixed wood frame window (which was orginally another entrance), and two northside entryways. Most of the windows on the first floor on the south side of the building and have been bricked in. The northwest (642 Woody) entryway is deeply recessed with a wood door with 3x3 lights in its upper half. Ornamental cinder blocks have been added to the walls of this entryway. A metal frame wire gate covers the entryway facade. A fixed recessed wood frame window is located above the entryway. Fixed wood frame ribbon windows are located on the west and north sides of the building at the same level as the window above the northwest entryway. "The Brunswick Block" is painted on wood panels above both sets of ribbon windows.

The entryway at 223 Railroad Street on the north side of the building is angled and recessed and is composed of a single entry door and a large flanking fixed window. A slightly protruding wood awning is located above the wood framing. The entry door is wood frame with four upper half opaque lights and lower half-painted green panel. The

window, which is located to the west, has wood molding and two vertical metal frame dividers. A single entryway door located at the east end of the building consists of a wood frame wood door with upper fixed transom window. The door has four recessed panels in the lower two-thirds and a glazed window in the upper one-third. A large, recessed, two-pane wood frame window is located on the first floor in the building's clipped southwest corner.

The building has generally good integrity of design, materials, workmanship, and association on the first and second stories. The bricking—in of some of the windows, the use of cinder block in the northwest corner entryway, the alteration of the southwest corner entry, and painting of the brick has caused some loss of integrity. However, the framing of the northside entryways appears to be original, giving the building excellent first floor integrity for its age.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Brunswick Hotel is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under criteria A and C. It is one the oldest remaining hotels in Missoula associated with the beginning of the railroad era. It was constructed during Missoula's first railroad era building boom, just before the crash of 1893 and is located just across Railroad Street from the location of the old railroad depot. For that reason it is representative of the the first wave of hotel construction that occurred to accommodate railroad workers and passengers. It was part of a once-thriving commercial district running along Woody Street, south of the old depot.

It also qualifies for listing under criterion C as it is an excellent example of vernacular commercial architecture, with a Queen Anne emphasis. The dentilated cornice, brick relieving arched windows, clipped northwest and southwest corners and brick pilasters add visual interest to this unique, triangular, clipped corner design. The building has very good overall architectural integrity.

This hotel was built between 1890 and 1891, when the property was owned by either James Osborne or Caroline Hutter. Subsequent owners included James Harvey Biggs (1891), the Missoula Building and Loan Association (1896), Lizzie Heckler (1898), Frank Thomas (1928), Business Properties Securities (1930), and Clarence Smith (1944). The Sanborn Maps indicate that it was originally called the Brunswick Hotel. James Osborne and Ed Rhodes were managers in 1890, James Osborne and Harvey Biggs in 1891, Charles Heckler in 1903, George M. Durham from 1907-1917, and Charles and Lizzie Heckler between 1922 and 1928. The hotel appears to have been converted into an apartment building in about 1930. It is listed as offering furnished rooms during the 1930s. The early (1893, 1902, 1912) Sanborn Maps show a saloon located at 642 Woody, a dining room at 223 Railroad, and a kitchen at the east end of the building. The Brunswick Store is listed at the 223 address for a time, starting in 1925, and William Talbert, barber at that address in the 1930s. Peek's Drug Store is listed at 642 Woody in the late 1920s and the 1930s. See continuation sheet
