DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE The B. F. Hastings Building is a two story brick building at the corner of Second and "J" Streets in Sacramento. It is nine bays along Second Street, and four along "J" Street. The building has recently been undergoing an extensive restoration program, with the cement Second Street facade now having been removed. New brick and mortar has been, and will be, laid, and the interior is being completely refinished. The intention of the restoration is to recapture the early-American period, i.e. post-1848, period of Sacramento. The national significance of this landmark derives from the events which are associated with the structure at 1006 Second Street, rather than any distinguishing architectural value.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

From April 1860 to March 1861, the R. F. Hastings building in Sacramento served as the western terminus of the Pony Express. One of only two buildings still standing associated with this brief but romantic episode in the development of the West, the Hastings Building symbolizes the gradual drawing together of the remote, isolated California frontier, and the more settled areas east of the Great Divide.

HISTORY

Faced with only a three month mail service to California via a sea route around Cape Horn, the stagecoach and freighting firm of Russell, Majors, and Waddell, established the Pony Express to provide faster overland mail service. They sometimes even achieved their goal of 10 day service on the route from St. Joseph Missouri to Sacramento, California which operated from April 1860, to October 1861. Although they had expected otherwise, the venture was an economic failure, and the firm never gained the mail contract it had hoped from the U.S. government.

Expert riders were chosen, from a pool of boys and small men, who rode fleet horses in relays, They carried half-ounce letters bearing a 10 cent U.S. stamp, and a \$5 Pony Express stamp, in four leather boxes attached to a device called a "mochila" especially designed for the purpose, and fitting over the saddle. The route covered 1838 miles and included 157 stations from seven to twenty miles apart. "Home Stations" were located at intervals of 75 to 100 miles, with each rider changing horses from six to eight times on his ride from station to another. After a rest period, he carried the mail in the other direction. Among the best-known of the Pony Express riders were William (Buffalo Bill) Cody, and "Pony Bob" Haslam.

The brief life of the Pony Express ended in 1861, when the transcontinental telegraph line was completed in October 1861, ending all need for the former.
