## Significance

The Keauhou Holua (Toboggan) Slide (HASS-50-HA-D3-2) is the largest and best preserved slide in the State of Hawaii. This slide, extremely long (1290 feet), steep, and wide, served as the "Olympic Games" <u>holus</u> of the Hawaiian people.

Certain pastimes were restricted to the chiefs, the most spectacular being holua sledding. A track of rock, layered with earth and made slippery with grass, was made for tobogganing on a narrow sled. The sled or pape consisted of two narrow and highly polished runners, from seven to 18 feet in length, and from two to three inches deep. The two runners were fastened together by a number of short pieces of woods varying in length from two to five inches, laid horizontally across the runners. The contestants grasped the sled, ran a few yards to the brow of the hill or starting place, and throwing themselves forward, fell flat on the sled, and slid rapidly down the hill. Those who rode the farthest were considered the victors. This sport was extremely dangerous and only experts participated.
