Built in 1763, this imposing three-story late Georgian house stands on a slight elevation overlooking the old harbor. About 42 feet square, the structure has a wood frame, clapboarded walls, quoins at the corners, and three end chimneys. The main facade in five bays wide; first-story windows are topped by segmental pediments, second-story windows by elaborate swan's neck pediments, and third story windows, reduced in size, are set up against the elaborate cornice. Windows on the rear or garden elevation have flat arches with rusticated voussoirs as caps, their keystone lengthened. The end or side windows have no pediments.

The hip roof is cut off to form a flat deck and this captain's walk is enclosed by a handsom balustrade that is topped with urn finials. These urn finials are repeated again, in slightly different and larger form, atop the four posts of the street-front fence. To the right of the house is a small office or counting house that was erected in 1810.

The center door opens into a hall of unusual spaciousness (26 by 21 feet): more than half of the floor space of the front of the house is given to this great stair hall, which is one of the finest in 18th century New England. To the right, set against the exterior end wall, rises and a exceptionally handsome and elaborately carved flight of stairs, which is lighted by a fine roundhead window set in the rear wall above the landing. The ceiling of the hall has a well-proportioned denticulated cornice with carved modillions. On the walls is a rare Vue d'Italie paper, printed by Joseph Dufour in Paris between 1815 and 1820.

Directly opposite the front door and behind the stair hall is the drawing room, which is of generous proportions, but of surprising simplicity in contrast to the stair hall. Its chief adornment is the delicately carved festoon of flowers on the mantel. To the left of the front door is the dining room, richly embellished in contrast with the simple drawing room. The dining room doorway has a pair of simulated pilasters with reed consoles supporting the overpanel. The room has a sideboard set in an arched niche and the fireplace is faced with English tiles. The kitchen, located to the rear of the dining room, is entered through the pantry and has an ornate arched door leading into a cupboard.

The second floor central hall has a coved ceiling and three of its four bedrooms have richly carved overmantels. The third floor contains five more chambers.

The house and its large formal garden are maintained in excellent condition. Carefully restored, the Moffatt-Ladd House is finely furnished with period pieces and is open to visitors.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

(This site was declared eligible for the Registry of National Historic Landmarks under Theme XX, subtheme Architecture, Part I-Colonial Architecture, in November 1968).

This house was the residence from 1768 to 1785 of William Whipple, a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, sea captain, merchant, politician, general, and jurist. The house is also an outstanding example of a Late Georgian three-story frame mansion with elaborate exteriors and interiors.

Brief Sketch of the Life of William Whipple, 1730-1785.

William Whipple was born January 14, 1730 at Kittery, Maine (then a part of Massachusetts). After receiving a common school education, he went to sea at a early age and while still in his early twenties became master of a vessel. He was engaged for a time in the slave trade. About 1760 he gave up the sea and formed a successful mercantile partnership with his brother at Portsmouth, New Hampshire. About 1767 he married his cousin Catherine Moffatt of Portsmouth, the daughter of a wealthy merchant. Their only child died in infancy.

In 1775 Whipple retired from business and entered public life. He was prominent in the early provincial Congresses, a member of the New Hampshire council in 1776, and of the state committee of safety. He served in the Continental Congress from 1776 to 1779 and signed the Declaration of Independence. In July 1777 he was appointed a brigadiergeneral in command of the First New Hampshire militia brigade. late September 1777 Whipple led four regiments of New Hampshire militia, 1353 men, to upper New York Stat, helped encircle and besiege the British army at Saratoga (Schuylerville), October 10-17, and was present at Burgoyne's surrender. In 1778 Whipple led another contingent of New Hampshire militia in the Rhode Island campaign. 1780 to 1784 he was a member of the New Hampshire legislature. 1782 to 1785 he was Associate Judge of the Superior Court of New Hampshire and from 1782 to 1784 the receiver of finance for Congress in New Hampshire. Whipple died at Portsmouth on November 28, 1785 and was buried in the Union Cemetery of that town.

### 8. Significance: (1) Moffatt-Ladd House

a wealthy merchant, he presented the house to his son Samuel as a wedding gift in 1764. After his son's failure in business, Captain Moffatt repurchased the house in 1768 and lived there until his death in 1784. William Whipple, Moffatt's son-in-law, and his wife Catherine lived in the house with the old sea captain. The Moffatt-Ladd House is still owned by descendents of the Moffatts, the Ladd family, but has been leased and maintained by the National Society of Colonial Dames in the State of New Hampshire since 1913.
