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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Jose Castro House is a two-storey adobe with tile-covered gable roof and plaster-covered adobe walls. An important feature of the house, and that which enables it to rise to two-storeys, is its New England-type timber frame. The combination of Eastern and Western building methods was first done in Monterey, at the Thomas Larkin House. That was the prototype for this style which we call the Monterey-colonial, so handsomely exemplified in the Castro House.

The second floor cantilevered veranda on the North and South sides of the Castro adobe is a variation on the prototype which used a two-storey Porch. The water solubility of the mud bricks (adobe) was always a problem, and the extended roof line plus the shelter of the porches or veranda, helped to protect the walls somewhat.

The use of a heavy timber frame not only allowed the construction of the building up to that second floor, but it also allowed a lighter adobe shell to be used. Since much of the load of the building is carried through the frame, the walls can be opened up a great deal more to the windows and doors. In addition to this more liberal fenestration, evident in the Castro adobe, the cantilevered veranda also helps to convey a sense of lightness, which one then finds abruptly contradicted on the interior, for the heavy timber frame is therein frankly exposed.

The use of panes of glass beside the entrance door is certainly exceptional, and a deviation from the Monterey prototype. It may instead be seen as an attempt to inject a bit of Greek-Revival vocabulary (so fashionable during this period, in the East) into the Castro House.

The Castro House faces North onto the San Juan Bautista Plaza, and South into its own half-acre garden and orchard.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The much-altered Castro House in San Juan Bautista, is an excellent example of the Monterey-colonial style of architecture, as used outside the capital. Having its own special architectural elaborations and a strikingly-revealed mud-block construction, the house nevertheless conforms in all basic respects to the prototype presented in the Larkin House in Monterey in its horizontal massing, two-storey structure combining timber-frame and adobe shell, and upper-storey full length porch (here on two sides) providing for circulation between the rooms on that level.

HISTORY

Jose Castro was Commandant General of Northern California, and built this house facing the plaza for the residential use of his secretary, and for administrative use by himself. In 1848, just seven years after Castro had completed it, the building was sold to one of the members of the famous Donner Party, one Patrick Breen. The property was acquired by the state of California in 1935, and has since been open to the public as a part of the San Juan Buatista State Historical Park. Many historic personages have visited the Castro adobe, including William Tecumseh Serman, John C. Fremont, and Ulysses S. Grant. Helen Hunt Jackson, a novelist and poetess, began the writing of her popular novel "Ramona" (1884) at the Castro adobe.

The Castro House is located at the Southwest corner of Second and Washington Streets, facing the San Juan Bautista Plaza, and comprises all of the block bounded by Second, Third, Washington, and Mariposa, except for the lot occupied by The Plaza Hotel. That lot occupies approximately one-fifth of the block.

In addition to the Castro House itself, the lot covers a large orchard, extending west and south to Mariposa, and to Third Streets. The only structures on the site are the Castro House and a 19th century well immediately south of the house. The whole of the block is owned by the State of California, and administered by the Division of Parks and Recreation as part of the San Juan Bautista State Historic Park. The area of the site is approximately one acre.
