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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE The great U-shaped, one-story house is built around three sides of a large patio or courtyard and originally contained 13 rooms. The center or east section is 116 feet long and the north and south wings measure 96 1/2 by 18 1/2 feet and 98 1/2 by 20 feet respectively. The adobe walls are plastered and whitewashed inside and out and average three feet in thickness. The tile roof is of the shed type, sloping outwards towards the streets on all three exterior facades and presenting a sheer wall upon the inner patio sides. This roof is supported by hand-hewn timbers and beams that are lashed together with rawhide thongs. A one-story veranda extends completely around the three inner sides of the houses. The low-pitched roof of the corridor is supported by a series of widely spaced posts and all rooms in the house open directly upon this veranda. The large rectangular windows have heavy solid wooden shutters and originally contained no glass. The floor is tile. There were no fireplaces in the house and all cooking was done in a small separate kitchen. At a later date two fireplaces were added in the north wing.

The rooms are arranged in a straight single line. The main entrance is a wide passageway or hall with heavy double doors, which is located in the middle of the west or center section. To the left, originally, were the chapel and a bedroom, and to the right, the schoolroom and a bedroom. In the 1910 restoration, the partition walls separating the two bedrooms from the adjacent rooms were removed, thus enlarging the chapel and school room. The north wing contains two bedrooms, a living room, a later kitchen, and the servants' dining room. The south wing has three bedrooms and the large family dining room.

The house was also once topped by a small round wooden cupola from which the family and guests could watch the bullfights and festivals staged on the adjacent town plaza. This feature was not reconstructed in the 1910 restoration, but was constructed during the 1968 renovation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Estudillo House, erected in 1827-29, is a mostly rebuilt example of a typical large Spanish-Mexican one-story town house.

HISTORY

About 1824, the soldiers of the Presidio of San Diego began building their houses outside the adobe walls of the fort. In 1827, Don Jose Antonio Estudillo, a captain in the presidial garrison, was granted a house lot and by 1829 had completed the large house which still occupies the entire east side of town plaza. He later served as mayor and justice of the peace of San Diego. Acquiring three ranches by 1829, Estudillo became a wealthy man and his house was considered at the time to be one of the finest in Mexican California. A large hall in his house served from the early 1830's until 1856 as the town chapel and as a school. In times of revolution and war, the women and children of San Diego also took refuge behind the thick walls of the house. The structure was occupied by the Estudillo family until 1887, when it was abandoned and allowed to fall into ruin.

In 1905, the casa was bought by John D. Spreckles, who financed its restoration under the supervision of Architect Hazel Waterman in 1910. In 1968 it was deeded to the State of California by Mr. Legler Benbough, then the owner, and another restoration begun under the supervision of Architect Clyde Trudell. The restoration work was finished in 1969, and the house was furnished in time for San Diego's 200th Anniversary.
