DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Church of Saint James Santee was one of those laid out under the Church Act of 1706, and actually built in 1768. It is a simple, country, Georgian church which nevertheless clearly says to us that it had an architectural awareness of sophisticated form. While using standard period forms such as elongated round-headed windows on all four sides, a delicate palladian window in the east end, box pews organized into a rectangular plan under a slate, hipped roof, and a simple box cornice, the church also reaches out to introduce something new.

The pedimented classical porticos on both the north and south sides are aspects more elaborate than one would expect here, and the execution of the four brick columns on either side, is remarkably complete. The introduction of this element, here at this time, shows the desire to keep up with the fashionable building trends in centers such as Charleston. The eight brick columns have molded brick bases and capitals, and even a noticeable entasis.

The main entrance faces south, to the country road which passes by about 25 yards away. The original orientation of the church, with its delicate palladian window at the east end, was doubtless along the long axis, so that that window served as the backdrop to the communion table placed at that end. Unfortunately, for some unknown reason, this focal point of the religious service was moved during the 18th century to its present, rather awkward position in the middle of the north wall, directly opposite the main entrance. To accommodate this and form a vestry, the exterior of the north portico has been filled in with brick walls between its columns.

The heavy Georgian shutters and panelled doors retain most of their original hardware, while the interior too is original, with its box pews, pulpit, classical window frames, and coved celing, combining to create an effect of graceful simplicity.

Used only occasionally for religious services by the Diocese of South Carolina, the church then is open only from time to time, to visitors. It is located in a very remote area of Charleston county, with no other structures located along the dirt road to it, for at least a mile in any direction.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Saint James Church (Santee) is an excellent example of those rural South Carolina churches of the 18th century which achieved a remarkable sophistication in brick and/or stucco exteriors, and finely wood-panelled interiors. Saint James Santee introduced a new attempt at architectural distinction, using two pedimented classical porticos supported on four brick columns, a provincial reflection of the new splendor which was also being found in Charleston. The seating plan, which originally had the chancel at the end of the long axis, but now has it across the short one, was changed at sometime probably in the 18th century for some unknown reason.
