### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

West St. Mary's Manor is a one-and-a-half story house with gabled roof, brick basement and end walls, and front and rear walls of clapboards. Tall exterior double chimneys, with a one-story brick pent between them, rise at each gable end.<sup>1</sup> The house is 40 feet wide and 31 feet deep. The south (front) facade is five bays wide and has a center door with a small rectangular transom above it. The four tall windows on this elevation have nine over nine light sash and exterior paneled shutters. In the roof above are three tall and narrow dormers. The north (river) elevation is only three bays wide, but its center door and two flanking windows are similar to those on the front facade. The roof, on the north elevation, contains two dormers with four over four light sash. The brick end walls each have two smaller windows, one with four lights in the first-story pent and the other, located in the second story between the stacks, with six over six light sash. The west end wall also contains a side entrance, situated near the northwest corner.

The plan of the house, with its classically balanced four-room-and-center hall plan, represents an advance over the simpler one and two room plans of small 17th century dwellings. West St. Mary's Manor has a central hall separating the two main rooms on the south (front) elevation and two narrow back rooms on the north side. The center hall, extending through the house, is divided into two sections by means of a wooden elliptical or transverse arch. The rear portion of this hall, about 12 feet deep, contains a stair with paneled spandrel built against the west wall. The stair rail is chancelled on its upper surface and ends in a scroll above the newel. The rooms have deep wainscoting and each room has a fireplace. The living room, which is located in the southwest corner, has a chimney piece with broad facia surrounds.

<sup>1.</sup> A very common feature of Maryland 17th and early 18th century houses was the "chimney pent," located between double chimneys that projected outside the end walls. These chimney pents took many forms. Most commonly, and as illustrated in West St. Mary's Manor, the pent was a small closet with a shed or pent roof set between the chimneys. The pent wall could be built of brick or wood and it could be flush with the chimney face, as in this house, or project beyond. The chimney pent in effect added to the interior space and at the same time, buttressed the chimneys and added to massive appearance of the end walls. Chimney pents occurred outside of the chimneys as well as between and in some houses were two stories high, affording closets in each story. Chimney pents were also used in 17th and 18th century houses built in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SPECIFIC DATES

1700-1730

West St. Mary's Manor, erected in the period 1700-1730, is an outstanding and rare example of a small William and Mary brick-and-frame country house. A transitional house with center hall separating two main front rooms and two narrow back rooms, the manor house illustrates a point in the shift from the one and two room plans of 17th century Southern houses to the larger and more symmetrical room arrangements of 18th century structures.

#### History

West St. Mary's Manor, a 2,000 acre tract granted to Captain Henry Fleet on May 9, 1634, is the earliest grant of land known to have been recorded in Maryland. Based on architectural evidence, the existing manor house was constructed at some time between 1700 and 1730, possibly by the Daniel Bell family.<sup>1</sup> The farmhouse was in poor condition by the late 1930's and has been carefully restored over a period of years by the present owners.

<sup>1.</sup> By 1729 the estate had been subdivided into 15 leaseholds. A 1762 plat showing the location of each 1729 leasehold cannot be located, hence it has been impossible to pinpoint who held the leasehold to the tract of land with the existing house on it.

### PARCEL 1:

BEGINNING for the same at the end of course No. 14 (being North 87° 45 minutes East, 30 feet) of a deed from Ethel Goddard and James Goddard, her husband, Thomas McKay and Lettie McKay, his wife, et al, unto Whitney Leary and Elizabeth R. Leary, his wife, and recorded among the Land Records of St. Mary's County Maryland, on November 15, 1939, in Liber CBG 12, folio 29, and running the following courses and distances as shown in said deed:

N 1 degree 30 minutes East, 239 feet to a post, N 32 degrees E, 27 feet to a Sycamore Tree, N 11 degrees E, 331 feet to a Hickory Tree, N 9 ° 30 minutes East. 164 feet to a Sycamore Tree, N 20° 15 minutes East, 196 feet to a Sycamore Tree, N 13º 15 minutes East, 311 feet to a stake, N 10º 45 minutes East, 130 feet to a large Poplar Tree, N 8º 20 minutes East, 505 feet to a Chestnut Oak Stump and sprouts, N 10 degrees 45 minutes East, 302 feet to a Walnut Tree, N 32 degrees 30 minutes East, 39 feet to a Cedar Tree, N 54° East, 46 feet to a Cedar Tree, N 79° East, 185 feet to the shore of the St. Mary's River (at 119 feet on this course passing over a Concrete block fixed at the foot of a fence corner post on the North side of a small stream or cut to mark the boundary); then leaving said Adams land and running with the St. Mary's River and binding thereon S 62 degrees East, 200 feet, S 85 degrees 20 minutes East, 441 feet, S 38° East, 148-1/2 feet, S 5° east, 147 feet, S 36° East, 118-1/2 feet, S 69° East, 374 feet to a stake; then leaving said River Shore and running S 33° East, 45 feet to a Concrete Block fixed at the foot of a fence corner post, the corner of this land, the land known as "Peggins Point" now owned by W. No. 5 at folio 255, among the Land Records of St. Mary's County, and now owned by the Heirs of a certain Smith; then leaving said St. Mary's River and running the lines of said land as set forth in said deed with proper allowance for Declination of the Magnetic Needle to date, N 35° 52 minutes West, 172 feet to a Concrete Block fixed in the corner of the fence (at 10 feet on this course passing over a concrete block on the river shore to mark the Boundary); thence N 14° 20 minutes East, 875 feet to a Concrete Block fixed on the south side of the road leading to "West St. Mary's" Residence and to "Peggins Point" (shown as "Pagan Point" on Plat attached hereto) and near the old entrance gate, and being the end of course No. 65 of the 1939 Goddard/McKay/Leary deed, Liber CBG 12, folio 29; thence running in a straight line approximately 1,100 feet from the end of said course No. 65 to the point of beginning. being the end of said course No. 14.

Containing 167.5 acres of land more or less and being part of the same land as described as Parcel 1 in a deed from Elizabeth R. Blagojevich to Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, Williamsburg, Virginia, recorded among the Land Records of St. Mary's County, Maryland on December 3, 1976 in Liber 263, folio 77.

#### PARCEL 2:

BEGINNING for the same at a post set on the shore of St. Mary's River near the mouth of "Wheatly Creek", a boundary of Lee McKay's land (formerly) and running with said McKay's land the following courses and distances:

1. North  $40^{\circ}$  15 minutes West, 10.32 perches (approximately 170.28 feet) to a post on the said McKay's land;

2. THENCE, leaving the said McKay's land and running South 74° West, 4.64 perches (approximately 76.56 feet) to the post by the west side of a walley;

3. THENCE, South 25° East, 12.12 perches (approximately 199.98 feet) to a post on the shore of said River;

4. THENCE, running with said shore North 54 degrees East, 7.36 perches (approximately 121.44 feet) to the beginning.
