DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Built ca. 1800 by Francis Simmons, this three story house with raised basement is done in the Federal Style. The two story piazza located on the side of the house is typical of many Charleston dwellings during this period. Brick composition is Flemish bond and house has brick quoins at each of its corners. First floor colonade has stylized unfluted Corinthian columns. Second floor colonade has segmental arches and the roof over the piazza is denticulated. Basement is arcaded under the piazza. Windows are 6/6 double sash. Entrance door has small denticulated cornice over a transom. Roof is hipped with three dormers on each side of the house while one faces the street and the rear of the house.

House is enclosed by a notable fence of wrought iron with unusual stuccoed columns topped with sandstone balls.

House has extensive outbuildings connected to the main house at its rear.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Simmons-Edwards House is one of the city's most handsome houses with garden, beautiful woodwork and intricate wrought-iron decoration. Built by Francis Simmons in the Federal style, the house has wide piazzas overlooking the garden and extensive outbuildings connected to the main house at its rear.

George Edwards, after buying the property in 1816, enlarged the premises and created a garden which was separated from the house yard by a notable fence of wrought iron which had unusual stucceed columns topped with sandstone balls. This fence ran the entire length of the garden and had wooden pickets in serpentine curves. The iron work was installed by Edwards and his initials are in the ironwork on either side of the door that opens above the white marble front stairs. Granite posts were placed along the curbing to prevent carriages from being driven up on the sidewalk.

The Edwards ironwork shows the Regency style that followed the earlier Empire era which fairly well dates the work as after 1816. The gates of the house are known as the Pineapple Gates, but actually, Edwards originally ordered carved live oak acorns of marble to top the posts. They came from Italy as ornate pine cones, which were immediately construed by Charlestonians to be pineapples, hence the name.

In the architectural survey of Charleston, a jury composed of Dr. William Murtagh, Keeper of the National Register of Historic Places, Professor Bernard Lemann, Tulane University School of Architecture, Mr. Carl Feiss and Mr. Russell Wright, consultants to the city, noted this structure as exceptional. This notation indicates that the building is of the highest architectural design quality, well-proportioned, and architecturally sophisticated. Windows, classical orders or other period designs, chimneys, verandahs, massing, materials, textures, refined detail, and craftsmanship are all elegant and innovative. The structure is to be preserved and protected in situ at all costs.

ALL that lot, piece or parcel of land together with the buildings and improvements thereon, situate, lying and being on the East Side of Legare Street, between Tradd Street and Lamboll Street, in the City of Charleston, South Carolina, known as 12 and 14 East Legare Street.

Measuring and containing in the front along the West line on Legare Street, 104.41 feet; on the North line 279.40 feet; on the East line 106.01 feet; and on the South line 272.79 feet, be all the said dimensions more or less.

Butting and bounding, North on property of James M. Hagood; East on property of George L. Buist and other property; South on property now or formerly of Edward H. Perry, and West on Legare Street.

A Plat of said lot was recorded May 8, 1951, in the RMC Office for Charleston County in Book T-53, Page 219, which plat was made by John McCrady Company dated March 1951 and entitled: "Plat of property known as Numbers 12 and 14 Legare Street, situate in Charleston, South Carolina about to be conveyed to Bushrod B. Howard.
