DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Built in the period 1700-1722, the Samuel Huntington Birthplace is a large two-story frame salt-box house with a gable roof sloping steeply in the rear and a large stone central chimney. The main house is about 42 feet wide and 29 feet deep, or five by two bays in size. The exterior walls are clapboarded; windows are topped by projecting cornices and the center door is surmounted by a rectangular transom. A small one-story kitchen wing, built on the main axis, was added to the east end of the main house early in the 19th century.

The stucture has the typical floor plan of a New England centralchimney house: The entrance door opens into a short center hall that extends back to the center chimney and contains the stairway. To the left (west) of the hall is the parlor and to the right, the dining room. In back of the dining room is the large original kitchen with a huge fireplace and in the northwest (rear) corner a small bedroom. The fireplaces, wainscoting, and wide board floors are original. Wallpaper has been added to the walls of some rooms. Upstairs there are three bedrooms and one of these has a fully paneled fireplace wall. The little-altered house has never been restored. In good condition and still used as a farmhouse, the Samuel Huntington Birthplace is not open to visitors. A State highway historical marker in front of the house identifies the structure as the Huntington birthplace.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The birthplace and boyhood home of Samuel Huntington, a Signer of the Declaration of Independence for Connecticut, lawyer, politician, jurist, Governor of Connecticut, and President of the Continental Congress, from 1731 to 1747. Built in the first-quarter of the 18th century, the Huntington Birthplace has been little-altered.

## Brief Sketch of the Life of Samuel Huntington, 1731-1796

Samuel Huntington was born in Windham (now Scotland), Connecticut, on July 3, 1731, the son of a farmer and clothier. In 1747, at the age of 16, he was apprenticed to a cooper and served out his term of apprenticeship. Self-educated, Huntington studied law, was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law in 1758. He took up residence in Norwichtown, Connecticut, in 1760 and married Martha Devotion of Windham in 1761. They had no children of their own but adopted two children of his brother.

In 1764 Huntington represented Norwich in the Connecticut General Assembly. From 1765 to 1774 he was the King's attorney for Connecticut and from 1765 to 1775 a justice of the peace for New London County. From 1773 to 1783 he served as a judge of the superior courts. In 1775 he was elected to a seat in the upper house of the Connecticut legislature and was a member of that body from 1775 to 1784. He was a delegate to the Continental Congress from 1775 to 1784 and from September 1779 until July 1781, served as President of the Continental Congress, when he resigned this latter position because of his health.

In 1784 Huntington was appointed chief justice of the superior court of Connecticut. In 1785 he was chosen Lieutenant Governor and from 1786 to 1796 he was the Governor of Connecticut. He died at Norwichtown, Connecticut, on January 5, 1796 and was buried in the cemetery of the First Congregational Society of Norwichtown.

Historic Site Boundaries for the Samuel Huntington Birthplace: 2.

Approximately 10 acres of land in the shape of a rectangle, including the Samuel Huntington Birthplace House and barns, beginning at the southwest corner on the north shoulder of State Route 14 at latitude 41' 41' 54" north, --longitude 72° 05' 13" west, and proceeding northward about 700 feet in a straight line to the northwest corner at latitude 41 42' 01' North--longitude 72° 05' 13" West, then going east in a straight line about 500 feet to the northeast corner at latitude 41° 42' 01" North--longitude 72° 05' 06" West, then running south in a straight line about 700 feet to the southeast corner located on the north shoulder of State Route 14 at latitude 41° 41' 54" Northlongitude 72° 05' 06" West, then returning west along the north edge of State Route 14 for about 500 feet to the beginning, the southwest corner. Total acreage of the property is about 32 acres.

Precise boundaries for the 10-acre house tract, as described above, are recorded in black on a copy of U.S. Geological Survey Map: Scotland Quadrangle, Connecticut, 7.5 Minute Series (Topographic), 1953, on file with the Branch of Historical Surveys, Division of History, Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation, National Park Service.
