The house is typical of its period in that it is built on a grandiose scale, but is more so than almost any other private dwelling in the city. The windows in front are triple sash, while others are double sash; each sash contains two panes.

The Roper house was the first to be constructed on the east Battery and its outsized colonnade was built not only to support the portico, but to be admired from across the harbor, since there was at that time nothing between it and the Ashley River. Although some consider the house brutal in size when viewed at close proximity, its monumental features fall into perspective when viewed from across the river (which was the point in mind when the house was constructed).

Although records have been destroyed, the detail of the house would point to E. B. White as its architect. White was a Charleston architect of the period who designed many buildings in the area, among them Market Hall.

The portico is giant-order Ionic pentastyle with balustrades between the columns; the flat roof, too, is balustraded and there are several wrought-iron balconies.

So solidly were the Flemish bond brickcourses laid that the house survived unscathed by the earthquake of 1886.

treatment was not generally found during this period in the state.

In the architectural survey of Charleston, a jury composed of Dr. William Murtagh, Keeper of the National Register of Historic Places, Professor Bernard Lemann, Tulane University School of Architecture, Mr. Carl Feiss and Mr. Russell Wright, consultants to the city, noted this structure as exceptional. This notation indicates that the building is of the highest architectural design quality, well-proportioned, and architecturally sophisticated. Windows, classical orders or other period designs, chimneys, verandahs, massing, materials, textures, refined detail, and craftsmanship are all elegant and innovative. The structure is to be preserved and protected in situ at all costs.
