Begun in 1772, the church was gothicized by Francis D. Lee between 1852 and 1854. The building is a good statement of the emotional mood of the mid-nineteenth century when the romantic and picturesque were dominant not only in literature but also in building design. The building's remodeling was handled with a good deal of skill and today it carries a great deal of emotional impact still.

Of Gothic revival design, the church has a crenellated four-story tower and lancet-arched windows; the main entrance is a Tudor arch, while the eighteen-paned lancet-arched main tower window has a crocketed hood mould; all windows in the west (Archdale Street) facade have hood moulds. Lee designed the church's interior to simulate that of the chapel of Henry VII at Westminster.

The building is constructed of stuccoed brick and has false masonry buttresses.

In the architectural survey of Charleston, a jury composed of Dr. William Murtagh, Keeper of the National Register of Historic Places, Professor Bernard Lemann, Tulane University School of Architecture, Mr. Carl Feiss and Mr. Russell Wright, consultants to the city, noted this structure as exceptional. This notation indicates that the building is of the highest architectural design quality, well-proportioned, and architecturally sophisticated. Windows, classical orders or other period designs, chimneys, verandahs, massing, materials, textures, refined detail, and craftsmanship are all elegant and innovative. The structure is to be preserved and protected <u>in situ</u> at all costs.
