DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Webster House, "The Elms," at West Franklin, New Hampshire is a two-and-one-half-story frame and rectangular clapboard building with gable roof. Five bays wide, the shuttered windows contain double-hung sash, twelve lights over twelve, except for a smaller window above the front door which is twelve over eight. The house is entered through a six-panel double door with cornice, pilasters, and a five-panel transom. The rear facade has a similar treatment except that a porch has been added. The west side of two bays contain windows of six-over-six lights, except for a smaller window into the second floor rear room. This window may have been added recently.

The front door enters to a small foyer with open staircase rising to the second floor which could not be observed. There is a central fireplace, but the central chimney seems to have been removed above roof level, and covered by the installation of a new roof. The basic block has two rooms divided by the central fireplace. The west room has been partitioned, providing for a kitchen to the rear. The larger attachment to the east side of the house was probably added some time after the Webster descendents sold the house for use as an orphanage in 1871.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Ebenezer Webster, Daniel's father, moved into this two-and one-half story frame house, The Elms, in 1800. This home was nearby the tavern in Salisbury which Judge Webster had operated since 1784 and in which the family had lived for the preceding 15 years. At this time Daniel was away at Dartmouth, but he returned to the Elms often through the rest of his life since his father lived here until he died in 1806. Daniel's brother, Ezekiel inherited it and he lived there until his death in 1829, when Daniel bought it.

The Elms was Webster's experimental farm, vacation retreat, home and gravesite of his parents and his four brothers and sisters--"his solace to the end of his days." He decided to enlarge and develop the family farm into a prosperous stock farm. His visits to The Elms were seldom longer than two weeks, but by 1847, with completion of the railroad lines, he could travel there from Boston in three hours. On these trips he would visit and entertain old friends, review the farm, hunt and fish.

Today The Elms is an orphanage operated by the Sisters of the Holy Cross who have maintained the Webster house intact except for some necessary modernizations.
