DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Natchitoches Historic District is a mixture of late 18th century, 19th century, and turn-of-the-twentieth century Victorian architecture. The City itself, the oldest permanent settlement in the state, actually dates from 1714 with the founding of Fort St. Jean Baptiste de Natchitoches by Louis Antoine Juchereau de Saint-Denis. For over a century it was an important trading center with the west. Its location on Louisiana's Red River permitted direct shipping from New Orleans, and it soon became an important link in the pack train trails.

The plan for the town was developed from property lines radiating from the In the late seventeen hundreds these property lines became streets, a river. and later were intersected by other streets forming rectangular blocks. The area retains the atmosphere of a rural town with well-kept lawns and homes. Pride of ownership in this area is evident, and in recent years much restoration work by private individuals has boosted property values. The business area and the residential area are clearly defined due to early zoning restrictions. Front Street, which stretches the length of the business district, is brick paved and overlooks Cane River. This vista is one of the most beautiful in the South. The bank is terraced down to the river, and landscaped with crepe myrtles and oaks. Most of the opposite bank is also landscaped, and belongs to the city. The area in the old town section is not crowded and contains greenery in the business district. Old trees dot the landscape in the business district. New buildings that have gone up in the area in recent years have been designed to be compatible to the surroundings. Only those streets that run east and west are straight. Other streets are narrow and crooked, giving the appearance of quaintness since most of the dwellings were built at angles to the street.

The 1848 Conclin's New River Guide describes the city as follows:

Natchitoches is eighty miles above Alexandria. It is the last town of any size toward the south-western frontiers of the United States. The Spanish trade, for a considerable distance into the interior of the Mexican states, centers here; and it is the great thoroughfare for people going to and returning from those states. It is a very old town having been established above one hundred years ago. It is considerably larger than Alexandria [which is "the seat of justice for the parish, has a bank, a newspaper, a number of stores, &c."]. The population is a mixture of American, Spanish, and French. It is at present a growing place, and will probably one day become the largest town in this country, except New Orleans. There are many respectable families here; and the opulent planters have houses in the town, for the sake of society. The people are excessively fond of balls and dancing. It has a pleasant society, and a weekly newspaper, in French and English. The relations of this place with the immense country on the river above, and with the interior of the Spanish country, must necessarily be extended. It is beautifully situated on the shore of the river, and

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Natchitoches is the oldest permanent settlement in Louisiana. Established by the French in 1714 to promote trade with the Spanish and the Indians, and to keep back the Spaniards on the west, the town has been closely connected with the history of both Louisiana and Texas. The name, pronounced Nak-a-tosh, means "paw paw eaters" and was derived from the language of the Natchitosh, a tribe of Caddo Indians living along the Red River.

The Natchitoches Historic District is significant architecturally to the state of Louisiana as well as the nation because of its' number of buildings within the District constructed of boussilage type materials. These buildings are the only ones in this state in a concentrated area of this type of construction. Naturally there are various boussilage constructed buildings located throughout the state but in scattered locations. The largest boussilage type construction in the South and possibly in the United States is located in the Natchitoches Historic District. The house is commonly known as the Prudhomme-Rouquier house at 436 Jefferson Street. It is presently under restoration. It was constructed in 1806. Boussilage construction is a mixture of mud, moss or deer hair placed between posts. Batting is used to hold the boussilage in place until it is dried. Whenever a gallery overhang was in the house design, this boussilage was left exposed. However, if it was in an area of the building that could become wet, it was covered with a clapboard. Of course the boussilage constructed buildings within the District are of great importance; however the colonial, antebellum and victorian structures are of great significance also. It is this unique correlation of architectural designs that we believe makes the Natchitoches Historic District so unusual. The setting on the Cane River is superb. The City of Natchitoches has adopted the necessary ordinances to protect this District and the property owners have wholeheartedly accepted this designation and are cooperating completely.

For more than a century after its founding, Natchitoches was the center of the contest between France and Spain for trade and for territorial rights. France and Spain soon settled down almost in view of each other for a century of "watch-ful waiting." In the first few years of active colonization in Louisiana, Natchitoches, the closest point of contact on the border, became the focal point of interest in trade and in the inevitable conflict over boundaries.

extends back to the pine bluffs, on which there are already some handsome houses. It is at the head of steam-boat navigation. This place has experienced the successive regimes of the savages, the Spanish, French, and Americans, and has had its war dances, fandangoes, French balls, and American frolics. The traces of the ancient grave-yard are almost erased. Indians, Spanish, French, Americans, Catholics, and Protestants, lie here in mingled confusion.

Chartered in 1819, the City of Natchitoches was on its way to becoming one of the most important cities in the state when the Red River shifted away from the community and, about the same time, the River was opened to navigation as far as Shreveport.

A great deal of the charm of Natchitoches can be directly attributed to the change in the river channel; there has been little out-of-character modernization and many individual restoration projects have also keep the "old town" flavor.

Although LaSalle had visited the Natchitoches country in 1687, followed by Bienville and St. Denis in 1700, the post founded by St. Denis, known in early records as the Fort of St. Jean Baptiste de Natchitoches, was the first attempt at colonization. The choice of the site was a fortunate one. Situated at the head of navigation on the Red River, it had unbroken water transportation to New Orleans and it was close enough to the Spanish border to permit trade with the Spaniards and Indians in Texas and it was in the country of friendly Indians, who, from the time of LaSalle's visit, had formed a decided predilection for the French. St. Denis made Natchitoches the most lucrative trading center in Louisiana and won the French almost undisputed control over the Caddo Indian tribes and their allies.

The cession of Louisiana to Spain occurred in 1763. During the years of Spanish ownership, trade and colonization developed the post of Natchitoches. Through Natchitoches ran important highways connecting the east and the west, of which the best known was the King's Highway, now a part of the San Antonio trail. Over these highways passed, in a steady stream of pack trains, all the overland traffic between Mobile, Natchez, Texas and the Northwest territories. On the Red River, boats provided access to New Orleans and Europe. People from many nations passed through the district and some settled there.

The town of Natchitoches has been a seat of the government since the colonization of the district. It was given a charter in 1819. In 1872 it was incorporated as a city, and since 1912, the town has been functioning under a commission form of government.

In 1822 a census of the parish showed approximately 10,000 people and the inauguartion of steamboat navigation in 1824 gave further impetus to both population and trade. It was predicted that Natchitoches would be the most important city in the state after New Orleans. However, two unforseen events retarded future development. The Red River shifted its channel between the years 1825-50, leaving the town five miles from the river. About 1830, the log jam, which by blocking the upper stream had made Natchitoches the head of navigation, was removed by the United States government, and the river trade was transferred to Shreveport.

The shift in the river was the single most important factor that contributed to the preservation of the "Old Town Section" of the historic city. After the river shift, change wss very slow in Natchitoches. The years preceding the War Between the States were peaceful and prosperous. Activity centered largely in the rural sections, where cotton plantations enriched the owners and brought them something close to an idyllic existence. The homes built in Natchitoches during the French and Spanish regime, and also those built by the early Americans remained in their tranquil settings. The old street plats laid out in 1800 are the same today. Commercialization did not spread in the old town section. And, fortunately, when it did begin to spread after World War II, the emphasis was in a new setting that did not interfere with the charm and grace of old Natchitoches. Restoration in the old town section has been going on for the last 25 years. New buildings in the area are in keeping with their historic setting.
