#### **NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION:**

The Delavan Post Office is a large, two-story building located on the main street of downtown Delevan's business district. It sits on a neatly landscaped corner lot. Built in a simplified Neo-Classical Revival style, the post office is faced with light brown brick with raked mortar joints and limestone detailing. The building rests on a raised brick foundation with a limestone watertable and has a flat roof. The cornerstone reads: "William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, Oscar Wenderoth, Supervising Architect, 1914."

Wide granite stairs lead from the sidewalk to the front doors, located at the center of the three-part elevation. Cast metal pole lamps with glass globes stand on either side of the landing. The lamps appear to be original. The central portion of the building steps forward. Six brick pilasters with Tuscan capitals mark the bay divisions. The pilasters rise to the height of a carved, stone architrave that wraps around the building. Above the architrave is a brick frieze and then a denticulated cornice. Above the carved cornice is a brick parapet with stone coping. The parapet steps up at the three central bays. In its center is a stone panel inscribed "United States Post Office."

At the center of the facade is a replacement door with a transom above. Between the remaining columns is an eight-over-eight window with a four light transom above. The windows are modern replacements designed to match the originals. Above each transom is an elaborate carved stone lintel, resembling a section of cornice. In the wall space above each of the central portions openings is a stone panel framed in brick. The outer portions of the front elevation have one window per floor. The ground floor window is six-over-six. It has a simple stone sill and lintel. The second floor has nine lights; the architrave serves as its lintel.

The side elevations use the same window treatment as the outer bays. An opening on the east side of the building has been bricked in. An addition with a loading dock has been added to the rear of the post office. It is built of similar materials and does not detract from the appearance of the original portion of the building.

The interior lobby, located at the front of the building, has had some alterations. Plaster walls with marble piers remain. Some of the wood trim at the doors is original, as is the terrazzo floor. The post office contains a mural painted in 1984 by Rosemary Roth. It depicts vignettes from the city's history.

The building is in good condition.

## NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Delavan Post Office is evaluated in the context of the multiple property nomination "United States Post Office Construction from 1913 to 1943, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District." The post office is significant under Criterion C for Architecture and Criterion A for Government. The post office represents one of the very few examples of federal post office construction in the state undertaken prior to the adoption of the McAdoo standardization system in 1915. As a result, this building was designed as an independent project and not as one of many module designs used in multiple locations after the implementation of the McAdoo system. It also is a good, local example of the Neo-Classical Revival style. The architectural elements of the building are largely intact and the rear addition is sympathetic to the original design and materials. Situated on the edge of the business district, the post office is a focal point for the community.

## **Historic Context**

The Delavan Post Office is the first federally owned post office building in the community. Founded here in 1836, the local post office moved from location to location with the appointment of each postmaster, until the construction of this building in 1913.<sup>1</sup>

As part of the larger context of federally owned post offices in Wisconsin, the Delavan Post Office represents an early example of this type of federal construction. It was authorized under the Public Building Omnibus Act of 1912.<sup>2</sup> Further historic context on federal construction during this period is found in the multiple property nomination.

The Delavan Post Office is one of four post offices identified by the state inventory as designed by Oscar Wenderoth. His other designs include the former Waukesha Post Office (1913), the Menomonie Post Office (1913), and the Sparta Post Office (1915). The design of the Waukesha Post Office was unique in the state. The building has a semi-circular portico with fluted Doric columns. The building recalls, on a smaller scale, elements of William Strickland's design for the Philadelphia Exchange of 1832-1834.

Oscar Wenderoth (1873-1938) was a native of Philadelphia where he trained in local architects' offices. Wenderoth joined the office of the Supervising Architect in 1897. Ten years later, he was the office's Chief Draftsman. In 1912, President Taft appointed Wenderoth the head of the Supervising Architect's Office. His work there involved the design of Government buildings, primarily post office design. He left federal employment in 1929 due to failing eyesight.<sup>3</sup>

#### Significance

The Delavan Post Office meets the registration requirements for a federally owned post office as specified in the multiple property nomination.

The Delavan Post Office is considered eligible for listing under Criterion A, Politics/Government, as a relatively rare example in Wisconsin of a post office designed and constructed as an individual composition before the adoption of the Public Buildings Act of 1913. After this time, the majority of post offices were built by the Treasury Department to standardized designs. These later post offices tended to be of a more austere design, as a result of the need to generate a large number of designs in a short period and to keep costs down.

The Delavan Post Office is also recommended for listing under Criterion C, Architecture, as a local example of the Neo-Classical Revival style applied to a public building. This style was chosen for a number of public buildings, libraries, and banks. This building has a stepped parapet that expresses the hierarchy of the entrance, a denticulated cornice, and large Tuscan pilasters that support a simple architrave. The post office does not have the massive, stone columns associated with the style; however, the simplification of architectural elements as seen here is typical of the style's application to smaller and less costly buildings.

The Delavan Post Office remains largely intact, retaining most of its architectural and site integrity. The main façade presents much the same appearance as when it was built. The rear addition does not detract from the original character of the building and the replacement windows have been designed to match the originals and retain the overall composition of the building. The Delavan Post Office's location in the downtown makes it a prominent landmark in the community.
