NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

First Baptist Church is located in a residential area on a corner lot with a north-south orientation. A religious facility, this church is executed in the Mission style. However, this property, like many other properties that utilized revival styles during the era of this building's construction, borrows elements of other revival styles. There are elements of the Gothic, Tudor and Romanesque Revival styles suggested in the buildings massing and stylistic detailing. The building is stucco on wood frame with a concrete foundation, and features jerkin head gables, a gabled nave and parapet with tower, buttresses framing the entry and dividing the side façade into bays, arched openings for doors and windows and an arched niche attic vent. The current condition of the property is good, as it appears well maintained and is still occupied as a church. The building has historic integrity in terms of location, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. In terms of design, the main arched window on the front façade is now covered up with a plywood insert; however, it appears that this is not irreparable.

This religious facility is located within the First Addition, which was platted in 1913. The building is on a large corner lot with a gravel parking area to the west side of the building. Streets front the building to the south front and the east facing side of the building. The overall shape of the building is rectangular in plan. One story in height, there are three bays created on the front façade through the massing, fenestration patterns and door placement. On the side façade, seven bays are created through the articulation of the pilasters and fenestration. The building is constructed of wood frame with a stucco finish, and asphalt shingles cover the front gabled roof. There is a parapet at the front and rear facades. The building is on a concrete foundation and load-bearing wood frame walls support the roof.

Specific features of the building are its large entry tower, its windows and its doors. The building does not feature any porches but instead a large tower element with entries on both sides that serves as an entry vestibule. The windows are 5/5 wood casement windows that have been nailed shut, and have heavy screens and obscure glass added to them. The primary window on the front façade has been boarded up, but it is a large arched window. The secondary window on the front façade is also a wood casement window with an additional arch shaped transom over it. There are also arched transom windows over the entry doors with curving arched mullions dividing the lights. The doors on the building are located on the two sides of the tower, each set of doors addressing one of the streets that fronts the property. These doors are double wood doors with one small, centered diamond shaped view pane in each door. Above each of these entry doors is the arched transom window. There is also a single door on the east side of the building.

Important decorative elements on the building are the recessed niches for attic vents, the projection of the entry vestibule as a tower on the southeast corner of the building, the pilasters shaped to represent buttresses on the side facades and tower, the stepped parapet with a molded coping on the front and rear gable, the parapet with a molded coping that steps on the corners of tower, and the arched fenestration patterns. The interior of this building is of simple décor with stucco walls and little ornament. There are two outbuildings associated with the property. One building was at one time a house, and is located to the west side and rear of the property. It is of wood frame and has a side-gabled roof, but no date is available for its construction. The other building is much newer, and was built as two different additions. The first addition was built in 1953 and the second addition was erected in 1967. It is located to the rear of the building, and is aligned with the buildings east facing façade facing the secondary street that fronts the property. This outbuilding is of concrete block, and has a side gabled roof. The outbuildings are used as storage, classrooms and offices.

There have been few alterations to the building. The main arched window on the front façade was covered sometime after 1977, and concrete ramps were added at the entries. Nothing else appears to have been changed. This religious facility constitutes one contributing element to the nomination; the two outbuildings are non-contributing elements to the property.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY

First Baptist Church is significant under Criterion C as a good example of the Mission/Spanish Colonial Revival style under the context of Architecture in Casa Grande, 1900-1950. The significant date for this property is the date of initial construction in 1938. Indicative of the Mission style is the simplicity of form, the arched windows that punctuate the facade, and the minimal use of surface ornamentation. This property, like many properties that utilized revival styles during the era of this building's construction, borrows elements of other revival styles such as Gothic, Tudor and Romanesque. This property also has good integrity, as the only alteration appears to be the addition of solid material in place of glazing in the main arched window light on the front façade. This building is also significant under Criterion C for its construction under the context of Architecture in Casa Grande, 1900-1950, as it is one of only three public buildings in the survey area of wood frame construction. There are only seven buildings of this property type included in the area considered by the Historic Resource Survey- Casa Grande, Arizona (Pry 1998). As a member of the Community Religious Facilities property type, this building sits on a corner lot bounded by two streets adjacent to a residential area, as is common to properties of its type. The building addresses both streets with its entries, a feature of particular significance in this property type. It also has the exaggerated scale and architectural elements suggesting vertical height that are typical of properties of its type. It has a simple rectangular plan that forms a gabled nave, an asymmetrical front facade that is visually divided into three bays, as well as a division of the side facades into bays through repetitive fenestration and the articulation of buttresses. This property is owned by a religious institution for religious purposes. However, it nonetheless meets qualifying criteria considerations, as it is a religious property that derives it primary significance from its architectural distinction within the community of Casa Grande. The property has very good integrity in regard to its architectural style and is therefore is a good candidate for listing as a member of its property type.

HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

According to a newspaper article published when this building was dedicated, the First Baptist Church was formed in 1920; a later history of the congregation stated it was associated with the American Baptist Association. The congregation's first building was a wooden sanctuary building (which appears on the 1922 Sanborn map). The wooden sanctuary burned in November 1937 and was replaced in early 1938 with the present-day sanctuary. (This building is shown on the 1940 Sanborn map.) The educational concrete block building behind the sanctuary was built in two segments. The first, which contained three rooms, was erected in 1953. At about the same time, the congregation voted to leave the American Baptist Association and join the Conservative Baptist Association. The second part was added in 1967.
