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DESCRIPTION

The North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store is a two and a half story structure originally constructed c.1840 and modified to its current configuration c.1900. It is located at the center of North Conway village at 2683 Main Street at the southeast corner of Main and Kearsarge Streets. It is a distinctive commercial building with Boom Town Front commercial storefront. The exterior of the wood frame building is sheathed in narrow wooden clapboard siding trimmed with corner boards and frieze. The 3 x 5 bay structure is situated with its obscured gable end facing Main Street. A granite block foundation supports the structure with a partial basement in the front section and dirt crawl space under the rear of the building.

The anterior section of the gable roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles. A tall, narrow square brick chimney extends through the northeast corner of the roof. The wood-floored entryway is recessed between large plate glass display windows typical of turn-of-the-20th-century storefronts. Large windows also wrap around the northwest corner. Two of these windows feature "5 and 10" signs painted on the interior of the glass. The window corners nearest the door are supported by two five-inch diameter steel posts. A hand-crank awning extends across the entire width of the building just above the display windows and entryway. Bracketing is featured along the front of the building on the window heads. A louvered panel covers the window opening in the gable centered on the Boom Town Front; it opens into an attic that runs the full depth of the gable.

A one-story back ell projects east from the northeast corner of the main block. The current posterior wing, added c. 1940, features a painted steel roof. The ell is sheathed in clapboards, trimmed with corner boards and frieze. The windows on this back section are small and square with pairs of six-pane casement sash. There are four windows on the north and south sides of the ell and one on the east end.

The interior of the 5 & 10 Cent Store retains its historic ambience. The front and older section of the building features a tin ceiling and schoolhouse lighting fixtures. The walls are painted horsehair plaster on lath. Narrow vertical board wainscoting topped by a rounded molding is evident behind the original maple and glass candy counter. Varnished maple flooring has been uncovered up to the back ell. Battleship linoleum still covers the wood floor in the back ell. The original maple counters with glass sectioning are used throughout the store, although some new shelving and displays have been added over the years. The walls of the back ell consist of painted 18 x 30 inch acoustic tiles, while the ceiling is covered in 15-inch acoustic tiles. Maple shelving runs along the full length of the building, with pegboard attached to the shelving throughout the store.

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SIGNIFICANCE

North Conway 5¢ and 10¢ Store North Conway (Carroll County) N.H. 03860

The North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A and C. Under A for Commerce it is a rare survivor of the 5 & 10 Cent Store mode of retailing. Under C for Architecture it is an excellent representation of the Boom Town Storefront. The building retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association for the period c1900-1953 for Commerce and c1900 for Architecture. It is extremely well-preserved inside and out – the most intact business block in North Conway. It is the only unaltered example of a Boom Town Front commercial storefront in North Conway and it is one of only two examples of the traditional 5 & 10 Cent Store known in New Hampshire.

Commerce

The 5 & 10 Cent Store was an important mode of merchandising from the end of the 19th century into the mid-20th. These stores were characterized by carrying a wide range of goods at affordable prices. F.W. Woolworth, originator of the 5 & 10 Cent Store, operated a national chain of stores which was the largest in the country. There were other chains competing with Woolworth. In addition to these large companies, there were countless independent 5 & 10 Cent Stores doing business across the country. It was not unusual for there to be two, three, or even more dime stores in a single town.

The North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store is the oldest retail business remaining in North Conway village. It was established in 1939 by Sidney and Lillian Sweeney. In 1992 Lillian Sweeney sold to Philip and Shirley Alcott who continue to operate the business to the present day. It is a North Conway landmark and a popular North Country destination. Generations of customers have enjoyed the history, ambiance, and merchandise available here. Parents and grandparents continually visit the store to give their children and grandchildren the experience of a traditional 5 & 10 Cent Store.

As Karen Plunkett-Powell explains in <u>Remembering Woolworth's</u>, the 5 & 10 Cent Store had its origins in the late 19th century when Frank Winfield Woolworth opened the world's first 5 & 10 Cent Store in 1880. Woolworth's aim was to have his own store selling quality goods that any customer could afford, a store staffed by employees who treated every customer with respect. Woolworth's stores developed over a period of time in partnership first with his brother Charles and then with other partners. There were successes and failures along the way. By 1886 his handful of stores were increasingly profitable and Frank Woolworth relocated to New York City where he continued partnering with other businessmen.

The popularity of 5 & 10 Cent Stores continued to grow well into the 20th century. F. W. Woolworth's was the preeminent chain, although he had many competitors. In 1911 Woolworth merged his company with a number of what he called "friendly rivals" to create a huge national chain of 611 stores. W. T. Grants, S.S. Kresge, S.H. Kress, McCrory, and J.J. Newberry, Woolworth's major competitors, never matched his success. The same merchandizing techniques developed by Woolworth were utilized by his chain store competitors and the independent 5 & 10 Cent Stores that served towns and cities across the nation.

Widespread post - World War II highway construction, urban renewal, and housing and commercial development began to change downtown business districts dramatically. 5 and 10 Cent Stores were affected by the construction of regional shopping centers and development away from central business districts. By the mid-20th century, 5 & 10s had become akin to low-end department stores competing against discount stores and department stores. Many were either reorganized or bought out. In time the traditional 5 & 10 Cent Stores disappeared from downtowns cross America, as did their larger successors. By the 1990s even Woolworth's had

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closed. Today the North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store and Bailey's 5 Cents - \$1 Store in Ashland are the only known examples of the 5 & 10 Cent Store surviving in New Hampshire.

Architecture

The North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store is architecturally significant as one of two representations of the Boom Town Storefront in North Conway. It is the only unaltered expression of this false-front arrangement common to small frame commercial buildings dating from the late 19th century. In this style, the façade is extended upwards above the peak of the building's gable roof, hiding the roof and giving the impression of a taller and wider structure extending an additional story. The characteristic commercial storefront of the North Conway 5 & 10 Cent Store is also well preserved with its recessed center entry flanked by large display windows; to the side of this arrangement is a paneled door with glazed upper half accessing the second story space.
