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Description

The property at 460 Bellefontaine Street has a 2 ½ story, wood-frame single-family house and a one-story double garage, constructed in 1913 and 1917 respectively. The buildings are architecturally intact and contribute to the significance of the property under the multiple property listing, *The Residential Architecture of Pasadena, CA, 1895-1918: The Influence of the Arts and Crafts Movement.* The house exhibits characteristics of the property subtype, the two-story Arts and Crafts period house, while the garage has similar features but is also representative of the one-story bungalow subtype. Character-defining features within the subtypes include those associated with Anglo-Colonial Revival and English-influenced Arts and Crafts period residential architecture. The house design incorporates bold forms with subtle Craftsman elements, such as extend beams and rafters, extended eaves and extended headers. The property is in an area of large homes on large lots; buildings typically have deep front yard setbacks and generous landscaping with large mature trees on public parkways and in private yards. The house is sited on a slightly elevated lot with a low brick retaining wall at the sidewalk.

A child's playhouse in the rear yard appears to have been constructed in the early part of the twentieth century, but since there is no available documentation to verify that it is within the period of significance, it is considered to be a non-contributing feature of the property.

As is typical of residential architecture of the Arts and Crafts period, this house has an irregular plan and a complex gabled roof, and less typical, exterior walls of wood shakes combined with a first story (and foundation) that is plastered with gunite. The 58 foot length street elevation faces north with a broad gable intersected by a cross gable over three bays on the right and a smaller gable over a projecting one-story bay on the left. Within the large gable is a wide dominant brick and gunite, stepped chimney that is offset right of the gable. To the right of the chimney is a single casement window on the first story with leaded glass windows and a pair of casement windows on the second story. Fenestration of the bay to the left of the chimney consists of two window openings with leaded glass casement windows on the first story and two narrow vertical vent openings (taller vent in peak of gable with smaller vent to the left) with extended headers. The projecting one-story bay on the left exhibits Tudor half-timbered walls, three closely spaced double hung windows with wide board trim and a long planter box at the sills, and triple vents in the gable (taller vent in the middle).

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The primary facade faces west where the main entry to the house is located. This 50 foot length elevation is divided into three bays with the second story projecting slightly above the first story. The center bay contains a wide paneled door with triple vertical lights and a classical surround topped by a molded, bracketed cornice. A trim piece at the top of the opening comes to a subtle point and the square hanging light fixture is placed at 45-degree angle. Tall narrow leaded glass casement windows on either side of the entry are topped with Tudor-design molding. Brick steps and a generous brick platform at the entry have low, wide cheek walls of brick. On the second floor of the center bay are three equally spaced and sized casement windows. A large gable in the upper half story contains a band of five casement windows (three in the middle have transoms) and has a half-timber design on the shingled wall. The left bay of the west elevation has a two-story projecting bay with gunite walls trimmed with wide flat boards at the corners and around windows and leaded casements on first and shingled walls and plain casements on second. The right bay contains a tripartite casement with leaded glass on first and a pair of casements on the second story. The subtle use of half timbering and a double layer of shingles on the wall above the top of the second story windows is a unique feature of the house.

A one story covered, open-sided porch on the southwest corner is original to the house. The roof is supported by corner posts, grouped in threes, with wood brackets at the top.

The house has all original wood exterior screens that are hinged at the side. The only alterations are a brick chimney on the rear elevation constructed early in the history of the house, and replacement of some of the original tin gutters and downspouts.

The 20' x 24' double-car garage is sited on the southeast corner edge of the lot. It has a lowpitched front gable roof with rolled asphalt cladding. The exterior walls are plastered with gunite on the bottom two-thirds with wood shingles above. Original paired tri-leaf paneled wood doors have nine lights in the upper third. 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Statement of Significance

Constructed in 1913, the Henry A. Ware house at 460 Bellefontaine Street was designed by Henry Mather Greene. The single-family residence represents the property type "Arts and Crafts Single-Family Residences in Pasadena," and is an excellent example of Craftsman style within the subtype "two-story Arts and Crafts period house." It meets the registration requirements under Criterion C, as it exemplifies the values of design, craftsmanship, and materials which embody the philosophy and practice of the Arts and Crafts period in Pasadena and the property retains a high degree of architectural integrity. The house and garage have distinguishing characteristics of Anglo-Colonial Revival and English influenced Tudor. Major English-influenced features are a gable roof with moderate to steep pitched gables and modest eave extension and with the main roof orientation parallel to the front entrance, leaded glass windows, gable roof dormers and combination plaster/shingle exterior walls. Anglo-Colonial features are its main entry with classical detailing on the door and door surround.
