The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company building is a one-story, reinforced concrete structure. It is an example of a one-part commercial block, exhibiting elements of the Spanish Revival Style of architecture on a modest scale. The building is located in downtown Meridian, Idaho's second largest city located in the southwestern area of the state. The building faces east. It sits on a concrete foundation with a partial daylight basement; its roof is a flat with parapets. Its exterior is clad with stucco over concrete on the north, west, and south elevations; the street-facing east elevation is clad with a brick veneer. A concrete-masonry garage addition was constructed onto the west elevation in 1948, making the building's present-day dimensions approximately 25' x 51'.

The front (east) façade is typical of an early twentieth-century commercial storefront found in small towns. The bottom portion of the façade includes a recessed entryway between two display windows. A raised stucco foundation rises four feet on the east façade to the bottom of the windows; the rest of the wall surface is covered with a brick veneer set in a stretcher bond. The glazed wood panel door is recessed in the central entryway and is topped with a transom, currently covered with a decorative wood panel. A canvas bubble awning shelters the entryway. The windows are single-pane, plate-glass, framed with simple wood trim. There are transoms above both windows that are presently covered with business signage. Centered above the window and door transom areas is a corbelled brick frieze band. A small tile roof (only three tiles deep) descends from the parapet between two brick pilasters. Its closed eave is of curved white stucco.

The north and south elevations have stepped parapeted walls capped with concrete. Towards the eastern end of both elevations, a wood-frame, daylight basement window with three vertical lights is located below grade. Both elevations have small, rectangular louvered vents near the parapets closest to the east façade. Centered in the main section of the north elevation are two wood-framed, double-hung sash windows with 4-over-1 lights. West of the windows is a single doorway with a one light, 3-cross panel door topped by a single-light transom. Between the windows and the doors, a flush chimney projects above the stepped parapet and is capped in concrete. In the northern elevation of the garage addition, a flush door is located with one sidelight in its west side.

The south elevation has one, wood-framed, square, 6-light casement window and a louvered vent. No doors are located in the south elevations of the main section or the attached garage. The west elevation, which is the attached garage, has no windows or doors located in it; the garage door was removed and the wall filled in 1998.

The interior of the building has been altered on its first floor. The stairway leading to the basement and the basement layout retain their integrity; the basement was where the telephone equipment and the operators were located. No original telephone equipment or other furnishings are still extant in the basement. The building is one of the most intact historic structures still standing within the original platted townsite of Meridian.

Though very modest in its design, the red tile roof of at the front of the telephone building hints at some elements of the Spanish Revival Style of architecture, popular in the United States from 1915 to 1940.

The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company building is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places at the local level under Criterion A for its significance in the areas of Communications and Commerce. The property is associated with the expansion of telephone communications services in Meridian, as well as with early twentieth-century commercial development of the town of Meridian, when a significant number of infrastructure improvements and business expansion occurred.

CRITERION A

As railroad tracks were laid throughout southwestern Idaho, small communities sprang up along the lines. In 1890, a post office called Hunter was established nine miles west of Boise, Idaho's capitol city. Two years later, the Hunter post office was moved one mile west, and by 1893 the small village there was renamed Meridian. By 1903, the town was incorporated and included a population of 200 people.

Homer Tolleth, one of the town's original incorporators, built the first telephone line to Meridian in 1900. Several independent telephone companies, along with Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company of Utah, were already operating in Boise City. By 1906, the Meridian Farmer's Independent Telephone Company was listed in the Polk's Boise City and Ada County Directory, but no address was given for its location. Homer Tolleth managed this independent telephone company under various names until 1927. At that time, his exchange was located in the upstairs of a building located on Broadway and First streets. The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company incorporated the Meridian exchange in 1927, absorbed Tolleth's company, and he retired.ⁱⁱ

Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, incorporated in 1911, was formed from three former companies—Colorado Telephone, Tri-State Telephone and Telegraph, and Rocky Mountain Telephone and Telegraph. The Rocky Mountain company originally provided most of the telephone service throughout southern Idaho, and eventually incorporated the Idaho Independent Telephone Company of Boise into its network. By the 1920s, Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company had purchased numerous local telephone exchanges in the far west, including Idaho. When the Mountain States company moved into a community it often built new telephone exchange buildings to house its modern equipment. The apex of its construction efforts occurred between 1927 and 1929, when the national economy was booming. Mountain State's new fifteen-story headquarters building in Denver was constructed in 1927, and by 1929 there were 122 major buildings erected by the Bell System throughout the United States. iii

After weathering the agricultural depression of the early 1920s, Meridian residents saw improvements to its infrastructure and economy in 1927-1929. Paving of the nearby state highway was occurring, a sewer system was being laid, and there were prospects for a large new creamery plant to be constructed. Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company also made plans to construct a new telephone exchange building along what was then named East First Street (later renamed Main Street) between Idaho and Pine avenues. John F. Baird, publisher of the *Meridian Times* newspaper, owned the property and leased it to the telephone company. The Meridian building was part of a major half-million dollar investment by Mountain States in improving service throughout southern Idaho.^{iv}

Construction of Meridian's Mountain States Telephone Company building began in April 1928. A local firm, consisting of building contractors William Heikes, Gus Scholin, and William Howry, was hired to construct the building from plans provide by the telephone company. At a cost of \$5,000, the one-story building was constructed with reinforced concrete walls and foundation, a precaution against fire damage. The building's street-facing facade was clad with a pressed-brick veneer surrounding plate-glass windows on its front elevation. The operators and main switchboards were housed in the basement, with the main offices located on the first floor. The Meridian Times described the building as "handsome and convenient."

Mountain States Telephone Company leased the Meridian building until 1955, when its telecommunication services were consolidated into the Boise office. The descendents of John F. Baird sold the property to local resident Voris Botkin, who ran his real estate business in the building for several years. The property remained in the Botkin family until 1981. Hunter Investment Inc., a Meridian Corporation, bought the building and property in 1991. A weekly newspaper, an engineering firm and computer consulting services presently reside in the former telephone company building.^{vi}

The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Building in Meridian is one of the few unaltered historic business buildings still located along Meridian's Main Street and it serves as a visual link to the past, when, for over a quarter of a century, the company provided telephone and telegraph services to the burgeoning southwestern Idaho town.
