The Witter house is a solidly built Georgian mansion. It is a rectangular building with end chimneys and characteristic center hallway plan. A small ell projects from the back of the house. Externally the appearance of the imposing if not formidable. The foof is a monitor with small windows in it and it tops a large cornice with modillions. There are four tall chimneys. The horizontal mass of the facade is relieved by five vertical accents provided by the orderly arrangement of five shuttered windows on the second floor with four windows and a central door on the first. The windows are twelve over twelves with much of the original glass in place. The door has a fanlight overhead and a rched sidelights. The semi-circular shape of the fanlight is repeated over every window of the house by a wooden fan with the pattern of a sunburst set into a niche in the brick wall. These semi-circular motifs together with the fanlight of the main entrance and a large semi-circular niche with a wooden fan over the side door help create a pleasing and unified design as well and interesting textural relief from

Inside, each of seven fireplaces had a differently designed mantel. The two front rooms have free-standing columns. The moldings about the paneled doors and windows are formal, but not elaborate. The flooring of the front rooms is of large, wide boards of American larch.

Solidly built in the late Georgian manner, yet reminiscent of fifty or more years earlier in details, the house is well-preserved. Framing, partitions, window panes (75%), even furniture, are original to the house.

The house was built in 1820 - 21 by the first Dr. Orin Witter when he was just starting his practice. The name of the architect is not known. The next year (1822) the town of Chaplin was incorporated. Dr. Witter was the first Town Clerk. The house remained in the Witter family until 1960. Until then it was occupied primarily by doctors, e.g. Dr. Orin Witter III, and Dr. Orin Witter III. In 1960 it was purchased by another doctor, the present owner Brae Rafferty. Thus the Witter house has curiously remained a "Doctors"

The primary significance of the house is architectural. It is a superb example of Georgian architecture—pleasingly designed, well-preserved, and practically unaltered. The house has a monitor roof used in much earlier houses and peculiar to New England. That construction began probably as a kind of hipped gambrel, then a vertical board was added to tighten the two pitches and eventually raised a foot or more. Little windows in the monitor roof are found in the Witter house and this is an unusual feature.
