This house, built in 1823 by Henry Solomon, was referred to as a "field house." It now faces Vineville Avenue and is located on a piece of property which originally extended from Vineville Avenue to Ingleside Avenue and from Pierce Avenue to Holmes. It is said to be the oldest unaltered house in Macon. In design the house is an example of the simple type of architecture expressed in so many residences in the early nineteenth century. Its graceful proportions present a charm acquired without elaborate detail. The materials have the hand-made texture of that era. The wide boards, some eighteen inches wide, used for all ceilings and sidewalls are hand planed and hand sawn over a pit. The original sun-baked glass and the brick made on the site are characteristic.

The inviting one story entrance porch extends the entire five bays across the front of the lower story. The five barely pointed low arches are supported by rectangular wood columns which are separated by panels of light iron work.

The interior plan of the building is a simple entrance and stair hall with two rooms on each side. The present owners have furnished it in the character of the original era and have collected many valuable pieces of furniture, porcelains, and other antiques.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

This white frame house in the Early Republic style of architecture is one of the oldest houses in Macon. It was built about 1823 with hand-sawed bacrds, hand-made bricks, pegs instead of nails, as a farm owner's home. The builder was Henry Solomon, brother of Peter Solomon, a trustee of the Georgia Academy for the Blind (the first school in the state for the teaching of blind children).

George Smith owned the house after the Solomon family. Mr. Smith involved himself in the growth of the city of Macon by traveling to Washington, D. C. in 1900 to request money for a new post office and by serving as a director of the Macon Fair Association.

Mr. T. Baldwin Martin, the present owner and occupant, acquired the house in 1932. He, a well-known and highly respected attorney and trustee of Mercer University (Baptist college in Macon), and Mrs. Martin reared their family here and have kept the house and grounds in undisputedly good condition.

One of the most significant facts about this house is that its building date approximately coincides with the settlement of Macon.
