DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This bandstand is in a hexagon plan shape, completely of wood construction, with sheet metal roofing.

The floor of the structure is one story above grade, supported by a skirt of wood completely enclosing the floor construction. The foundation wall is divided into two parts: the first third of the height starting at the ground is a vertical wall of 12" lumber; the next two-thirds of this wall has an ogee profile, constructed of narrow boards, creating a transition from the larger foundation wall to a slightly smaller floor level.

A square column at each intersection of the hexagon supports a wood arch (ornamental) that carries the eave construction, which overhangs the floor slightly and is supported by carved wooden brackets (ornamentally). A low-pitched roof rises uniformly towards the side of each hexagon face until it intersects the small dome sitting at the apex. This dome is not visible from the inside of the bandstand, as the ceiling is flat wood. The dome has a lacy wood fringe surrounding its base, similar to one at the facia of the main roof.

Access to the floor level is via a straight flight of stairs on one face of the hexagon. A lacy wooden bannister completely surrounds the edge of the floor area and descends with the steps.

In general appearance, the structure presents a grand scale. Sitting on a flat plane, among large old trees, it is deceptively small until a human figure appears beside it or on the platform. It presently is painted entirely in white except for the vertical portion of the foundation wall which is painted a dark green. There is no clue to the original colors. The overall effect is of a large, highly ornamented confectionary. However its scale and good state of preservation, as well as its park setting, give it a continued functional and esthetic appeal.

In the description of Central City Park in the Macon City Directory of 1872 the Bandstand is referred to as "the music stand formed as a Chinese Pagoda, rising up in the center" of the park.

Comments by William R. Mitchell, Jr., Georgia Historical Commission "It is in 'the same vein' as the top of Longwood or 'Nutt's Folly' in Natchez, Mississippi". A picture of this is found in The Gingerbread Age, John Maass, New York.

"Like 'Nutt's Folly', the bandstand is a sort of oriental version of the Victorian style sometimes called 'Saracenic Style'."

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

This unique bandstand, one of the few of its kind left in this country, is prominately located in Macon's Central City Park, amid a grove of beautiful shading oak trees, and nearby a lagoon where graceful fountains splash on intriguing Egyptian lotus flowers and other aquatic flora.

This bandstand has been the center of many political, musical, social and pleasurable occasions since its erection in 1871 in the 250-acre park which was laid out shortly after Macon was founded in 1823.

Here Ex-President of the Confederacy Jefferson Davis and Mrs. Davis held a special levee for children on October 30, 1887. Here Mr. Davis stood with his hand on a table around which members of his cabinet held their last meeting, Mrs. Davis occupying a chair beside him. They shook hands with and sometimes kissed the little children as they filed past.

Here Ex-President William H. Taft spoke on November 4, 1909 (see Judge Charles H. Bartlett House), and band concerts, picnics, celebrations, barbecues, fiery speeches, have centered around this attractive aesthetic center piece of this public place which has been the locale of State Fairs since 1871.

Historian John C. Butler wrote in 1875, "No more convenient, spacious and better arranged buildings and grounds for the large assemblies and exhibitions of every description exists in the whole State than those at Central City Park."

Buildings are available for exhibitions, stock pens, and in 1927 Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, Commissioner of Organized Baseball, tossed out the first ball in a game that dedicated the new \$60,000 ball park and grandstand.


The race track at the Park was at one time the finest in the country. It was used during the early part of the twentieth century as a landing field, and aviators said it was the best in the Southeast. During the Park's long history it has served as winter quarters for harness horses and many circuses and varied celebrations; and many soldiers have encamped there during the wars in which our country has been engaged.
