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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Godfrey-Kellogg House is situated high on the cliffs overlooking Kenduskeag Stream in Bangor. At one time, the house overlooked the very prosperous Morse Mill and covered bridge on the Kenduskeag. The site of this Gothic Revival home is perfect for at one time the residents could see most of Bangor from the cliffs.

The Godfrey-Kellogg House consists of the main house with attached bayn, a carriage house, smaller barn and a dog house done in the same Gothic Revival architecture as the other buildings. All of the buildings are finished in a combination of clapboard, matched boarding and board and batten, decorated very lavishly with Gothic trim.

Above the carriage house and small barn are apartments, used by the present owners as guest homes.

The main house is a multi-gabled two story structure which overlooks the lovely landscaping of the estate.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Godfrey-Kellogg House was built ca. 1847 for John Gødfrey as a summer residence for his family. The architect and builder are at present unknown.

The significance of this complex of buildings lies in the fact that it is one of the finest surviving examples of Gothic Revival cottage architecture in the State. Also for the fact that it has not been altered, neither on the inside nor the outside. Much of the original furniture, which was designed especially for this house, still remains.

The grounds and buildings are well taken care of by the present owners who appreciate the historical and architectural significance of the buildings.
