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The First Congregational Church in Bennington is a large rectangular-shaped two-story frame structure with a projecting and pedimented vestibule and a three-stage tower and cupola rising from the gable roof. The walls are covered by whitepainted clapboards and the corners and angles are marked by wood quoins. The two-story entrance porch, or vestibule, containing three round-headed doors and crowned by a pediment, projects from the main structure. In the center of this porch, above the main and pedimented entranceway, is a large Palladian window, and the center of the tympanum of the pediment above is a small semi-circular window. The square tower, rising from the roof of the main structure, also contains a smaller Palladian window in each face, and the top of this stage is enclosed by a balustrade. Above this is a graceful open belfry comprised of eight\_columns, surmounted by an octagonal cupola or "lantern" with oval windows and pilasters at the angles. The tower is topped by a dome and weathervane. The windows in the main structure are arranged in two tiers; those in the lower level have flat arches and those in the upper story are topped by round-headed arches.

Within, the ceiling is vaulted and groined and supported by six tall Ionic columns. Each column is comprised of a single white pine, shaped and carved to include pedestals and capitals, and extends from the cellar to the roof timbers. The ceiling is in the form of a great cross, with a shallow dome situated at the intersection of its arms. Interior columns and vaulting are arranged to emphasize the cruciform design of the ceiling. Galleries extend around the north, west, and south sides of the rectangular-shaped audience room. The projecting apse at the east end was added in 1864. The large central Palladian window in the east wall and the present pulpit were carefully reconstructed, following the details of Asher Benjamin's Plate 33, in the 1935-37 reconstruction. The existing 48 box pews on the main floor and the seats in the galleries were also rebuilt at this time, based on the scars found in the old underfloor, which outlined the shape and size of the original pews.

Although having been subjected to partial replication and reconstruction, the greater part of the building still retains its historic fabric.


