The Maine State House at Augusta, constructed during the years 1829-1832, sets on a beautiful site overlooking the Kennebec River. This site was known as Weston Hill and was offered to the State of Maine by the citizens of Augusta for the site of the new Capitol in 1823. The offer was accepted in 1827.

Little visible evidence of the original structure remains to even suggest what it must have looked like at its completion in 1832. One must refer to earlier views and plans to actually see the original structure. Parts of the original building are still there to be seen but it has been altered and realtered many times over the years.

The Maine State House was designed by Charles Bullfinch (1763-1844), first native born American architect. The construction of the Capitol Building was carried out under the direction of William King, Maine's first governor, acting at the time as Commissioner of State Buildings.

The original structure was 146' long by 50' wide with an 80' by 15' portico. The doric colonade of the portico was recalled in the rear facade by pilasters of the same order. A dome and lantern cupola surmounted the central section of the structure. The four story building was constructed of grey Hallowell granite and the inside of the building was of wooded construction.

The alterations to the Capitol Building began in 1852 when RECENED rooms were finished in the north and south wings of the basement. In 1860, six committee rooms were added. Exterior alterations were not NATIONA REGISTER begun until 1891 and commenced with the addition of a three story ring on the west. During the years 1901 and 1910 the State House was rebuilt (See Continuation Sheet)

to the point of retaining only Bullfinch's front and back facade and the rotunda. The length of the building was increased to 300' and a 185' dome was added. G. Henri Desmond of Boston drafted the plan for the rebuilding and work was done under the supervision of Charles S. Hickborn of Augusta. The George A. Fuller Co. of Boston was given the contract for the entire project. A 12' copper gilt statue of Augusta was added to the top of the new dome.

Today's State House, in its remodeled condition, is a typical example of late 19th and early 20th century American Legislative Buildings. The building is a large four story, rectangular structure with wings to the north and south. A wing projecting to the west terminates with a round bay. The main entrance is through a porch at the east elevation, on the second floor level. This leads to a veranda on the third floor level which is also a main entrance to the third floor.

The windows at all levels are rectangular except for the third floor where arched openings occur.

There are three domes on the structure, one over the center and one over the House and Senate wings. The center dome is sheather in copper. The lower drum is decorated with columns and the second drum with pilasters and balustrade, which are painted and textured to represent granited two side domes are flattened over monitor lights.

The State House is set a mid beautiful landscaping and is surround by a masonry and stone fence.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The historical significance of Maine's State Capitol Building cannot be overemphasized, for it is at the State Capitol in Augusta that all the major decisions relating to and affecting the History of Maine have, and will be made. To write the historical significance of Maine's State Capitol would be to write a History of the State of Maine.

What is significant about the State House at Augusta, other than its history as the seat of Maine government, is its architecture. The fact that Maine's Capitol Building was designed by Charles Bullfinch, one of America's greatest architects, is one of its most significant attributes.

The Maine State House is also the only recorded work of Charles Bullfinch after his return to northern New England in 1830. The Maine State House was the climax of an architectural career that spanned half a century. This building was one of Bullfinch's greatest achievements and remains so even in its altered condition. Of even greater significance, architecturally, is the fact that of all the buildings designed by Charles Bullfinch, the Maine State House is the only one to have had a complete set of the architect's plans survive to this day. These plans were found inside the wood lining of one of the brick safes in 1941 and are now housed in the State Archives at Augusta.

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
