Edgewood is a two-story frame structure situated on a two-acre lot in one of Montgomery's more attractive residential sections.

Basically rectangular, the house has a two-story central portico terminated by a low pitched pediment, accented by modillions beneath the cornice. The modillions extend across the front of the house beneath the cornice.

The columns which support the portico are square and taper toward the top. On both levels of the portico they are connected by a balustrade of rectangular stock.

Doors on both levels are similar having flat transoms and sidelights with diamond shaped leaded glass probably c. 1900. Door trim is ornamented with round Federal style medallions and the double paneled front doors have the original silver knobs and knocker. The portion of the facade behind the portico is faced with wide "ship lapped" boards which contrast with the narrower clapboards of the rest of the house. This section is terminated with square pilasters.

There are four windows across the front on each floor, having simple moldings and small pedimented architraves. These windows have shutters and are double hung having 9 lites in each sash.

The exterior of the house is unaltered except for the kitchen, originally a separate unit, which has been joined to the rear of the structure. There are two one-story porches with gabled roofs on either end of the house, located between the end-exterior chimneys. The wall behind these porches has the same wide board treatment as the central portico.

The house is divided by a wide central hall which has a staircase on the right. The staircase is divided into three flights and has a rounded balustrade with two rounded balusters per tread. The base of the steps is carved.

The front central hall leads into a small back hall or sitting room. To the left of the front hall are the parlor and dining room and to the right are two bedrooms. Rooms are mostly 20' by 20' with random width virgin pine floors. All sills are mortised and pinned together with large wooden pegs. Interior door trim is simple and ornamented with round corner medalions.

The house is furnished for the most part in pieces from the result to 1850 period. Most of the furnishings have been in the house for some time and consist primarily of Empire and French Revival pieces 2 197

Edgewood is the oldest remaining residence in the city of Montgomery. Built in 1821 by Zachariah T. Watkins, the house was dismanteled timber by timber in 1832 and reconstructed on its present site. The original certificate of entry for the 300 surrounding acres of land included in the grant bears the date 1818.

In 1855 the house and plantation came into the possession of Peachy Ridgeway Gilmer, brother of Governor George Gilmer of Georgia. Upon Peachy Gilmer's death, the plantation and house went to his wife Caroline Gilmer, and she in turn willed it to her grandnephew and step-grandson John Gregory Thomas. Thomas enlisted in Semple's Battery during the Civil War and was twice wounded in the Battle of Atlanta.

He married Harriet Louise Wimbish. Their son Jett Thomas, Sr. left the home to his son Jett Thomas, Jr., whose widow still occupies the home.
