DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ruth Mansion is a five-bay, two-story-plus-attic Georgian house with an east frontage. The front facade is laid in Flemish bond with stucco below the first-floor level. The belt course is partially obscured by a first-floor porch, covering the three center bays, and a centrally-located second-floor bay window.

The main house block has been enlarged by various additions. To the north, a lower two-bay frame wing is attached, with its two-story porch. To the west a brick wing, two rooms in length, is joined at cross axis to the main block. Several frame additions extend the house to the west, and obscure the original rear facade.

The south gable wall, flush with the rear brick wing, is laid in five-course common bond, with a window to the west of the chimney, and two symmetrically-placed attic windows.

Within, the house has been divided into three separate sections. The north frame wing is independent. This wing contains two first-floor rooms divided by an enclosed winding stair and fireplace and a rear shed kitchen. The second floor contains two chambers divided by a hallway.

of two floors. The north room features punch and gouge detailed mantel with pineapple motif, and paneled window casings. The stairway is open through both flights to the attic. To the rear, or west, a dining room and kitchen have been added.

The third section includes the south room and rear wing. In the wing are located two rooms, each having a fireplace, with two chambers above, connected by a winding stairway. In the main house block the

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ruth Mansion House today shelters several families in apartments that divide the interior. This division may be the result of an earlier owner's last will, dated 1822. William Ruth divided his home lot between his son, Samuel, and Peter Stout, probably a son-in-law. The dividing line began at a corner of the road leading to Muddy Branch and continued through the house's front yard, running along the wall separating the hall room from the entry, thence to the adjoining property line on the road. Ruth specified that the line through the house be repeated in the second floor and in the attic. Samuel got the north end of the house and property, and Peter the south end.

William Ruth had prospered in business, judging from the property mentioned in his will. In his will, he left a dry-goods store to his son and son-in-law; his daughter's legacy included a blacksmith and wheelwright shop, together with an adjoining parcel of land.

The Ruth Mansion was already a landmark in Leipsic, then called Fort Landing, well-known during William Ruth's lifetime. When the General Assembly set up five Kent County election districts in 1811, William Ruth's house was a polling place for Little Creek.

south room and the south bed chamber, though not as finely detailed as the north, have paneled window casings and chair railings. The first-floor fireplace is flanked by a butterfly-shelved cupboard and a south window.



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8. SIGNIFICANCE (continued) ---

William Ruth was also involved in schemes for public free education in Delaware. Until 1792, free education was non-existent in the State. The Delaware Constitution of that year provided for free schools to be supported by the State, but not until 1796 did the legislature designate tavern license and marriage license fees to be used for this purpose. The fund created by the 1796 Act lay dormant until 1817, when an appropriation was made for the education of the poor. William Ruth served as one of the five trustees for the distribution of this appropriation, which was too small to be effective. Since the fund was designated a charity, its public acceptance was severely limited.

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
