DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Andrew Fisher house has been gutted of almost all its original interior features. It is a two-story brick structure with an attic and basement; a one-story wing to the west of the main block was added at a later date. | Oriented in a southerly direction, the house sits atop a hill overlooking the Christina River. Its symmetrical three bay, center doorway facade would indicate a Georgian plan but the interior has been altered appreciably. Almost no original woodwork remains. The exposed structural members show evidence of being 5 m m cut at a saw mill, but this does not rule out their eighteenth-century origin, as Andrew Fisher was operating a saw mill on his property. z The purlins of the gable roof as well as two heavier braced rafters S are the only visible hewn members. The rafters are pegged and marked 刀 C Stone foundations support the one-and-a-half-foot-thick brick walls. O Segmental relieving arches are evident in the basement supporting 1471 the two chimney stacks which rise at the peak of each gable. fireplaces diagonally cut one corner of each room in which they are the located.

The brickwork of the house is unique. The front or **FEGISTER** facade is laid in Flemish bond with a convex moulded watertable and a double belt course. The east end also is laid in Flemish bond, however the water table is now of concave moulded brick. The cornice continues around to mark the attic level on the gable end. The rear of the structure shows Flemish bond brick coursing broken by a glazed header course every sixth course. This pattern is continued around the west end and curiously shows up in some parts of the rear

wall of the wing. The wooden window frames are surmounted by a header brick lintel. If this lintel was repeated in the door, it has been obliterated by its subsequent enlargement. The original front door is no longer in use but the evidence of a wooden stoop, now gone, is evident in the brickwork.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Andrew Fisher, a miller, purchased land and a mill seat on the Christina at Sheriff's sale January 4, 1768. The sheriff mentioned the land as being the site of the Abbington Furnace and Samuel James' Forge. This forge had been built by Samuel James, the son of James James who was one of the original grantees of the 30,000-acre Welsh Tract.

The abundance of iron ore in the area brought success to James in his first ironmaking venture, and by 1725, he had attracted several Pennsylvania iron-masters into a company known as "Abbington Iron Works." This company built a blast furnace near the James forge and apparently continued in business for about ten years. Samuel James operated Abbington Furnace and the forge until 1734, when his property was ordered to be seized and sold. It appears that each member of the company still held claim to some of the land, for the Sheriff advertised a one-eighth share of the land belonging to the furnace would be sold. Abraham Taylor and John White bought Samuel James' land and his share of the furnace. Whether or not they continued in the iron industry is uncertain, but the property still was called James' Forge when it was sold to Fisher in 1768.

Andrew Fisher erected a grist mill and saw mill on the land.

after Bradley's default. Forester failed as	well, and in 1815, the land
