AL (*if known*) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Sutton House, in St. Georges, is a three-bay, two-and-a-half-story brick structure with a lower rear wing. The southeast, or front, and the northeast facades are laid in Flemish bond, with common bond below the first floor level; the northwest and the southwest facades are laid entirely in common bond.

The front, or southeast, facade features a semicircular fanlight over the portal, which occupies the left bay, and flat wooden lintels with dentil detailing over the windows.\*

On the northeast facade two lines of fenestration occur between the chimney lines in the gable portion. The roof in this front portion has been extended over the gable walls, the brick massing joining the chimneys has been removed, and hammer-beam detailing has been added below the eaves. A two-story porch presently covers the entire northeast facade of the rear wing. m

One door punctuates the southwest facade at the right bay of the rear wing. On the gable end portion, a line of fenestration occurs left of center, and the extended roof and hammer-beam detailing are repeated.

The first floor of the front section, composed of two rooms adjoining a side hall, is ornamented by bulls-eye corner block detailing on all doorways and windows, and on the two fireplaces. The windows in this section also feature a modest splay in the casings and paneled wall section below the sills.

Detailing in the rear wing, as well the southern bedrooms, is of a simpler variety than that of the as in first-floor rooms. The disposal of rooms on the second and third main floors is patterned on the first with the addition of a south room over the entrance hall. The rear wing on both floors is one room deep and two rooms in length with an enclosed box stair connecting the two floors and basement.

The basement foundation walls are of random-cut stone below grade, surmounted by brick laid in common bond. Two dependencies, to the west, remain: a smokehouse, possibly original, laid in common bond brick and a stable sheathed in board and batten siding.

Residents of the town of St. Georges know the Sutton House as one of the earliest structures in the area. For nearly two hundred years, generations of Suttons have lived in the house and have been associated with the settlement and growth of St. Georges.

John Sutton, born in 1767, was the son and namesake of the first of his family to settle in Delaware. His father farmed near Dover, where, presumably, the son was born. John Sutton moved to St. Georges as a young man, and served as the town's first, and, for a time, only merchant. His descendants date their house between 1792 and 1796. An older part of the house, now a kitchen wing, may have been finished during those years. The main portion of the house probably was completed by 1815.

John Sutton first appears in New Castle County Deed Records as a purchaser of St. Georges land in 1801. Apparently he continued to buy land, coming to own, at one time, half of the land that comprised the town. The right-of-way for the road leading from St. Georges to Delaware City was his gift to the County. As a Jeffersonian Democrat, Sutton served on the Levy Court and in the State legislature.

John Sutton's eldest son, James, returned to St. Georges to practice medicine after taking a degree at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. He opened the first drugstore in St. Georges, located in the first floor of the Sutton House. In addition to the drug business, Dr. James Sutton turned his varied talents to operating bark, saw, and grist mills in the town, and to serving as its postmaster for forty years. As a member of the Light Horse Company of St. Georges he maintained order during the building of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal.

James Sutton's fourth child Albert continued his father's drug business in St. Georges. Fittingly for the grandson of one of the town's largest early landowners, he was one of the incorporators of St. Georges in 1877 and served as a member of the town council. In 1885 President Cleveland appointed him postmaster.

The house is now occupied by James N. Sutton IV, five generations removed from the first Sutton to settle in St. Georges.
