The Liston House is a brick, three-bay, gambrel-roofed structure with a subsidiary frame wing on axis to the south. Two chimneys pierce the roof line at the north and south walls of the main structure.

The east, or front, facade is laid in Flemish bond with fireglazed headers. The roof is punctuated by two shed-roofed dormers.

The facade is distinguished by a beveled water course that drops under the center bay to accomodate the entry. The entry portal is surmounted by a rectangular light, and is covered by a porch of recent origin which stretches along the front facade. Below the water course in each side bay, a segmental arch defines a basement window.

The north facade is an integral brick wall with a gambrel gable. The west facade is quite similar to the east in its disposal. Laid in common bond brick coursing, the north and west walls are belted by a squared water course.

The interior of the Liston House is composed of two major rooms. The north room, the larger, is accessible through the entries to the east and west, and communicates to a similarly disposed upper floor by a stair to the side and front of the chimney. The south room adjoins the lower wing.

Edmund Liston built his house around 1739 and and his father, Morris Liston, had bought sometime before 1702. In that year, the elder Liston received a patent from the government of William Penn, but he was mentioned earlier, in 1680, as owning land adjacent to the land Ephraim Herman bought from an Indian named Mechaeksit. There is also a confirmation of land on Cedar Creek to Morris Liston in the Duke of York Record, dated 1675.

The position of Liston's house, near the water's edge, was a precarious one, especially in the first half of the eighteenth century when privateers prowled the waters of Delaware Bay. On the morning of July 12, 1747, "a Company of Foreigners, Spaniards, to the number nineteen" disembarked near his home, ransacked it, seized a Negro girl, and forced Liston at gunpoint to accompany them to the home of his neighbor James Hart, where the plundering was repeated.

Liston and Hart took their case to the Provincial Council of
Pennsylvania, demanding that the government guarantee its citizens
security. Governor Thomas, executive of Pennsylvania and of the three
Lower Counties, was in England, so the Council was forced to consult
members of the Pennsylvania Assembly. Their disagreement over
tactics revealed growing tensions in the colony between the beliefs
of the Quaker ruling faction and the exigencies of governing a colony

during the period of Continental wars.

Two ships were setting sail for England on July 22, ten days after the incident in Delaware. The Council agreed that:

"... accounts of the several Publick Matters that had been before the Council since the departure of Governor Thomas, particularly those relating to . . the late bold Act of the Spanish Privateer in Plundering Liston's and Hart's Plantations shou'd be transmitted to the Proprietaries."

The message emphasised the concern of the people for their defense in the face of such attacks, and the concern of the Council itself over its lack of authority to pass laws.

The Assembly of Pennsylvania was less concerned. The answer the members sent to the Council held that:

... the Defense of the Province hath been a matter already much controverted. And were we under no Restraint from the Principles profess'd by most of us, it would not be a easy Task to persuade us that the measures which have been proposed for the Defense of the Province, either by erecting fortifications or building Ships of War, would be of any real use to the Province."

The Assembly maintained that the surrounding colonies, as well as the difficult navigation on the Delaware, formed a buffer zone for Pennsylvania. Inhabitains of more exposed areas were living at their

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own risk.
