The Columbus Junction Community Building, formerly the Columbus Junction School, is a two-story brick building composed of one large block with one wing on the south side. The broad cornice below the hip roof is supported on diagonal brackets. clamps indicating tie rods are visible on the exterior and one on the interior. The glass of the sash windows is the original. The voussiors of the window arches are of brick and limestone. interior has been subdivided (probably in the 1940's) by modern partitions but the original layout visibly consisted of three large rooms on the first floor, and three on the second plus two smaller rooms which may have served as offices. The doors, hardware and woodwork, including the walnut newel post and rail bannister on the centrally located stairway, are original. Ceilings in all the rooms are high except in the east portion of the first floor where the ceiling was lowered for the present day library facility.

The entire structure was damaged in a fire in the 1960's but only the second story rooms have not been restored to working conditions.

The Columbus Junction Community Building, one of the very first brick buildings in Columbus Junction, has served as a vital part of community affairs since its erection in 1882 This two story brick building with prominent belfry served as a school houseuntil 1919 or 1920 and continued to be used for community gatherings after WPA repairs and renomyations. No knowledge has been preserved of the architects' names or the origin of the materials used in the building, but since the brick seems to be of finer quality than other local brick, it is assumed that much of the material was imported from another location. The design of the building indicates a well-preserved example of a local vernacular style built to suit the specific needs of a certain function (education) for a community of a certain size. dominant simplicity of the whole is enhanced by the flourish of such details as the belfry (non-extant) and the carving of the interior stairway bannister. This building still serves as a community building and houses a well-used library and meeting room.
