Forest Retreat, residence of Governor Thomas Metcalfe, is a large story-and-a-half brick house that he built circa 1817-In Historic Kentucky, J. Winston Coleman, Jr. called attention to its "unique brick cornish on the front and side walls." He also mentioned that the shallow pedimented portico on the front porch with its slender posts is of a later period. The front facade is composed of a two-story central section bisecting the story-and-a-half portion. A broken pediment appears at the top of the two-story central section. Below the pediment is a shuttered window which was originally a door. The main entrance is a double door which is surmounted by a glass transom. Each half of the one-and-a-half story portion has two Behind the main section of the house is a shuttered windows. wing that has a graceful arched door and window.

According to Coleman, "the interior trim includes wide ash floors, beautiful reeded doors and window frames, exquisite Adam mantels and a spacious front hall with a graceful stairway and cherry handrail." The present owners restored Forest Retreat in 1934. At that time the dogwalk between the kitchen and house was enclosed to form a breakfast room. The front of the house was altered by removing the door on the second floor above the front entrance so this space could be converted into two bathrooms. More recently a screened back porch was added on the north side of the kitchen. Presently, Forest Retreat is in superb condition.

Forest Retreat Tavern was built circa 1806 by Thomas Metcalfe. The main section is of clapboarded log. The front section of the roof was extended to form a roof for the long front porch. At the center of the building is a two-story section, consisting of one room upstairs and one down. Another one-story section is on the far side of the two-story section. One of the additions was made by Governor Metcalfe in 1820. Earlier there was another room on the western side of the tavern; however, it was removed about 25 years ago.

Forest Retreat Farms, Inc. includes four buildings: Governor Thomas Metcalfe's residence, Forest Retreat Tavern, a stone stable, and Daniel Boone's cabin. All four are located on Thomas Metcalfe's original tract of land.

Forest Retreat, Governor Metcalfe's home, is a large story-and-a-half brick house. In <u>Historic Kentucky</u> Winston Coleman called attention to its "unique brick cornish on the front and side walls." Forest Retreat was built by Governor Thomas Metcalfe around 1817-1820. It was named by Henry Clay when he first visited the newly built house. He said to Metcalfe, "Tom, you have here a veritable Forest Retreat." Other famous visitors who stayed overnight at Forest Retreat included Andrew Jackson and William Henry Harrison. While teaching at nearby Western Military Institute in Blue Licks, Kentucky, James G. Blaine, unsuccessful Presidential candidate in the election of 1884, boarded at Forest Retreat.

3-511-000 Thomas Metcalfe, the 11th Governor of Kentucky and whose nickname was "Old Stone Hammer," was born March 20, 1780 in Fauquier County, Virginia. A few years later, his parents moved to Kentucky. Thomas Metcalfe had access to his father's large, well-chosen library of all the standard English works of In 1796 Thomas was apprenticed to an older brother to become a stonemason and, in 1797 Thomas built the thick foundation of the Old Governor's Mansion, Frankfort, where he later resided as Governor. He also built a number of stone buildings in Kentucky. In 1806 he married Nancy Mason and they were the parents of four children. He made his first public speech in 1809, and later served from 1812 to 1816 in the Kentucky House of Representatives. In the War of 1812 he commanded a company of volunteers and led them at the Battle of Fort Meigs. Between 1819 and 1828 he was elected to five terms in the U.S. Congress. In 1828 he was elected Governor of

Directly across the road from the tayern is the post stable that was built circa 1820-1830 by one of Metcalfe's slaves. The walls of the stable are of native limestone, laid without mortar, and are still in very good condition. The ends of the loft are enclosed by clapboard. The long sloping roofline is extended to cover an open air section on either side of the stable. At a later date the stalls were added on the interior, but the original timbers supporting the loft are intact. The stable was restored by the present owners in 1935. It is in good condition and is used for stabling horses.

The log cabin was reportedly constructed circa 1795 by Daniel Boone. It was completely rebuilt in 1945 by the present owners. A few of the original timbers were used in rebuilding it. The cabin was also moved about 200 yards southeast of its original location.

All four of these buildings are located on Governor Thomas Metcalfe's original tract of land. In 1804 he bought 250 acres, which he later extended to 1500 acres.

Kentucky. However, for a few days after the inauguration outgoing Governor Joseph Desha did not allow him to move into the Governor's mansion. Desha disliked turning it over to the stonemason who had helped build it. Thomas Metcalfe served as Governor of Kentucky from 1828 until 1832. Between 1834 and 1838 he was a member of the Kentucky Senate. In 1840 he became the president of the board of internal improvements. Between 1848 and 1849 he was appointed and later elected to the U.S. Senate to fill the vacancy caused by John J. Crittenden's resignation to become Governor. He engaged in farming on his estate from 1849 until he died of cholera August 18, 1855 at 75 years of age. He is buried in the family graveyard located about 150 yards behind the house. Metcalfe County, Kentucky is named in his honor.

Also originally owned by Thomas Metcalfe are the post barn, which was constructed by his slaves circa 1820-1830, and the tavern which was built by Metcalfe in 1816. The well-known tavern was also called "Forest Retreat." It was one of the stops on a stagecoach route that stretched between Zanesville, Ohio and Florence, Alabama. Since it was also a mail route, Forest Retreat Tavern served as an early post office.

On the farm is a log cabin allegedly built circa 1795 by Daniel Boone with the help of Simon Kenton and in which Boone and his wife reportedly lived from 1795 to 1799 before they moved to Missouri. This cabin is very significant to local citizens.

The present owners who purchased Thomas Metcalfe's original 250 acre tract of land have spent nearly thirty years restoring three of the buildings and plan to begin restoration of the fourth, the tavern, in the near future.
