DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Northwest Point consists of Government lots 1, 2, 3, and 6; Section 15, T 168 N, R 35 W, Lake of the Woods County. The boundary of the tract is as follows:

Beginning at a point where the International boundary between the United States and Canada intersects with the north bank of Harrison Creek; thence north along said international boundary 4,410.12 feet to the shore of Lake of the Woods (49° 23' 04" N.L.); thence along said shoreline to the mouth of Harrison Creek; thence southwesterly along the north bank of said creek to the point of beginning containing 122.30 acres more or less.

Historically the area of the Northwest angle and northwest point has been lowland and swamp. The bedrock of the area at the angle is granite, and is thinly overlain by glacial and lacustrine deposits. The original township survey map (1892-1903) shows the entire area of the point as swamp.

In the early twentieth century the construction of a dam at Kenora at the inlet of Lake of the Woods caused the rising of the water level and flooded land which once was not originally under water.

Northwest point is presently marsh and submerged marsh with a small portion of deciduous woods and brushwood at the south along Harrison Creek. At least fourteen cellar depressions of buildings that must have comprised the heart of the settlement of Nor'west Angle exist on the level creek side. The ruts of the Dawson Road are still descernible along Harrison Creek, the road grade becoming more and more clearly defined as the trail passes from field to forest.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Following the War of 1812, the Treaty of Ghent called for a commission to reconcile the conflicting British and American land claims in the area between Lake Huron and Lake Superior, to the most "northwestern point of Lake of the Woods". In 1818 diplomats settled this western line, adopting the 49th parallel, then the southern boundary claimed by the Hudson's Bay Company, as the boundary as far west as the Rockies. The Treaty of Paris, 1783, drew the line due west from Lake of the Woods to the Mississippi River. Since this was geographically impossible, the convention of 1818 decided upon a simple solution (one that had been discussed in earlier negotiations) namely, to run a line due south from the northwest point of Lake of the Woods to the 49th parallel.

This action was decisive. Apart from the important matter of fixing the long line westward, the agreement of 1818 gave to the United States that curious projection of land known as the Northwest Angle -- American territory separated from the rest of the land area of the United States by Buffalo Bay, a southwestern arm of the Lake of the Woods. Agents of both governments were sent out to mark and map this line and finally completed their work and submitted finished maps in 1824. The Treaty of Ghent also required that the reports of these commissioners be referred to some friendly sovereign or state as a final umpire, but this was never done.

In 1870 a corps of surveying engineers at Pembina discovered that the supposed line was really more than 4600 feet south of the true line. Some believe that the reason for this was that the boundary was never marked in 1824 at all. In 1872 a new commission was set up to mark the international boundary. At this time it was discovered by the Canadian commissioner that the landing stage for the boats running on Lake of the Woods, a Hudson's Bay Post, and a half a mile of the Dawson Road lay within the boundaries of the United States. Also located within the area under question was the Canadian village of Nor'west Angle. This village was born of the fear by the Canadian government that the isolation of the Red River Colony would lead to its annexation by the Unites States. The colony was being forced to look to United States territories for its needs and commerce. of this concern developed the Dawson Road (1870) which ran from Fort William on Lake Superior to Fort Garry. This route soon became the most heavily used into the expanding Canadian West. From Lake Superior to the Northwest Angle this passage was primarily a water route.

#### 8. Significance

the Northwest Point, the water-borne freight, mail and passengers were loaded into carts and stage for the last lap over the Dawson Road to Ste. Anne des Chenes. It was at this focal transfer point at the mouth of Harrison Creek, that the town of Nor'west Angle grew up. Tradition says that at the height of its brief and uncertain glory, Nor'west Angle had a population of around five hundred people, including personnel connected with traffic along the Dawson Road, Hudson's Bay Company men associated with the fur trade, mixed-breeds, and Indians.

But despite the efforts of Canadian commissioners to secure this point where their interests had already a great foothold, the 1818 boundary was officially adapted in 1874, and what some Canadians call the "incredible bungle" on the international boundary remains.


