DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Blythewood was completed ca.1859, but is constructed in an architectural style very unusual for Middle Tennessee. The two-story white brick has been called French Colonial. The <u>main</u> center form of the house has a bay section running the full two stories. A main hall and double parlors with sliding doors along with a large formal dining room and kitchen make up the original downstairs portion of the house with the above portion consisting of four large bedrooms.

A single-story wing was added to each side of the front at a later date (probably the 1870's) at which time a back gallery was enclosed and some cast iron trim was probably added. A sun room was added on the south side with a terrace immediately behind it looking out on the formal gardens.

The interior of the house has been very fine in detail with heavy plaster cornices and medallions in the double parlors. Two marble mantles are found in the parlors with a carved wood mantle in the dining room. A handsome stair ascends to the second floor with beautiful newel post and banisters. The original floors in most rooms have been covered with hardwood flooring in recent years but the woodwork has been maintained in fine condition.

The exterior trim on the house -- shutters, brackets, cast iron-are all in good condition, but the house stands vacant today and some windows have been broken by vandals in recent months.

The house sits on a large plot of land recently bought by a group of businessmen as an investment. It has been vacant for about two years now and the shrubs and gardens have not been maintained. A small brick smokehouse, dating 1859, and an early log cabin -probably servant's quarters -- remain immediately behind the main house. A rock wall surrounds the grounds and the entrance columns at the main gate are topped with pineapples -- the symbol of hospitality.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The house known today as Blythewood was constructed by Thomas Keesee between <u>1856-1860</u>. Keesee, a coach maker, came to Columbia in 1837 from Richmond, Virginia, and by 1856 began construction of what was one of the finest homes in the town. Built in the French Colonial style, this imposing two-story brick house is the only one of its style in the county, but it would hold its own architecturally in any area.

Not only is the house outstanding, but the gardens of Blythewood are equally notable. Although not kept for the past few years, evidence of three fine gardens to the south of the house is readily discernible. The Doric columns that form a pergola in the first garden are still covered with wisteria and most of the other plantings are still there.

The house and its surroundings have escaped the ravishes of the Civil War and other natural disasters that wiped out other homes in the immediate vicinity. It stands as a monument to the taste and cultural background of the early builders in the area.

The present owners hope to incorporate this structure into the development of the property. It is possible to adapt this house to some modern use as this property is on the edge of the city of Columbia and it is considered a prime location for urban development.
