DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE
Original: Felsengarten is a 14.8 acre parcel of rough wooded land on a mountain slope, upon which sits an eight-room house begun in 1896 and completed in 1900. It is built over a full basement of native rock walls and dirt floor and has acretaining wall all along the uphill side to protect the house from downward shifting earth and boulders. The first floor consists of a kitchen with large coal stove, two large pantries, a dining room, entry hall, a large parlor with giant fireplace and large picture window, and an open porch (the roof of the purch recently collapsed under heavy snow). The second floor includes Thomas' study, the master bedroom, a smaller bedroom, a hallway, and an early example of an indoor bathroom. The study and the master bedroom are finished in finely fitted and highly polished wood wainscotting on all walls and ceilings. The second floor abounds with buil -in bookcases, shelves, and cupboards used to contain linen, blankets, books, and papers, etc. The third floor has a hallway and two small bedrooms. The house has no central heating system and is otherwise in original condition except for the addition of the following: electric stove and hot water heater in kitchen, replacements of original commode and bathtub in second floor bathroom and electrical wiring in several rooms. Some internal water damage occurred, but a new roof was installed before damage became irreparable. At the same time, the basement walls were reinforced.

The exterior architectural aspect is somewhat unusual, reminiscent of Dutch Colonial form but finished entirely on all exterior surfaces with cedar shingles, many of which are highly bleached.

Theodore Thomas devoted himself to the grounds, laying out avenues and making wood paths, turning a marsh into a pond (after much labor, he made a pond near the house), cutting away unsightly growths, felling useless trees cutting and pruning. Mrs. Thomas planted extensive flower beds which were well known and admired in horticultural circles. Their industry made Felsengarten a pleasant summer retreat, as described at length in her book, Our Mountain Garden.

descendants of Mrs. Thomas' plants and flowers flourish there during the warm months, and her book describing her gardens provides a comprehensive blueprint for restoration of the surrounding terrain.

The property is marked by an air of quiet and solitude conducive to study meditation and concentrated creative work.

The owner has kept the house in practically the same condition as when Thomas was alive. The original furniture and artifacts (important historical relics, scores, mementos, letters, autographs, photos, and documents) are still in the house. There has been some pilferage of furniture in recent years. Internally, the house is in need of minor repairs such as repainting of wood trim, replacement of some wallpaper, etc., and some furniture needs reupholstering.

Thomas for the difference. It is through his efforts that this country is the home of the best in orchestral music, that almost all major cities have symphony orchestras of the first rank, and what is more important, that in each of these cities there is a public that will listen to the finest symphonic works."

Rose Fay Thomas died in 1929. After the death of Theodore Thomas in 1905, she continued to use the house every summer, and it soon became a mecca to which many famous tourists came to bask in its exquisite beauty.

Mrs. Thomas wrote at Felsengarten two books, The Memoirs of Theodore Thomas, and Our Mountain Garden (describing the Felsengarten estate). Theodore Thomas completed there many of his compositions and orchestrations and programmes for future concerts, and there were received at Felsengarten such items as an original poem by Henry Van Dyke, a ms. composition by John Knowles Paine, and autographed programs from Busoni and others.

Based on an appraisal of the inventory list of the literary and musical contents of the reference books, musical scores, photos, and other mementos housed there, the Newberry Library of Chicago has verified that these items are of significant historical and monetary value. Felsengarten would seem to be a fit continuing repository for these items and the ideal focus point from which to perpetuate the name of Theodore Thomas. The house bears witness to the eminent musical position that Theodore Thomas held in American history.

The historical significance of the site derives primarily from the prominence of its former residents and their world-renowned guests, and from the special solace it provided to one who shouldered vast public burdens for the betterment of American music. It seemed to Thomas a veritable paradise on earth; and he never spent an unhappy moment there.
