DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The three-story "cream-city" brick structure fronts on North 8th Street and New York Avenue at the very center of downtown, in the middle of the urban renewal project. Except for the remodeling of a small portion of the facade's first story, the exterior remains intact; its ornate brickwork, with varied patterns, courses, and colors give it a special interest and character unique among Sheboygan's 19th Century commercial buildings. At the west end of the building (the rear) is a quaint arched brick entranceway used originally as a service entrance for horsedrawn vehicles.

The condition of the exterior is generally good and the building is structurally sound. The first floor interiors have been remodeled over the years to suit different tenants and uses. Only a few elements of original detail exist here. The drug store part of the first floor had its floor dropped to street level several years ago. The remaining portions of the first level are storage for the drug store, and through August 1972, a doctor's office. The upper floors and stairway, though altered little, have deteriorated to a significant degree in spots; primarily because of water damage from a leaking roof and poor upkeep. Ceilings are 12 feet high throughout. The doors, windows and trim are all of wood with painted finish. The stairway to the second floor has a unique split landing arrangement. On the second floor are several interconnected office cubicles. The third floor is made up of a large assembly room with two smaller rooms at the west end.

At present, a tenant for just the first floor (an imported gift shop) has remodeled that floor, and the Redevelopment Authority was able to spend about \$3,000 (temporary property management) to make necessary code repairs to the building in order to secure an occupancy permit.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The southwest corner of Eighth Street and New York Avenue in downtown Sheboygan has long been associated with the retail drug business. In 1859 Dr. Julius Breitzmann opened a pharmacy here in a small frame structure. In 1886 Breitzmann died, and his firm was acquired by Max R. Zaegel and Dr. Carl Muth. The building was then moved to a site adjoining the Bank of Sheboygan, and the present three-story brick structure was erected. Zaegel carried on his business until 1920 when he sold it to I. C. Thomas, who, in turn continued his drug store until 1971. The original tenant of the upper floors was the Sheboygan Business College.

The design of the building is credited to the A. L. Weeks, Sr. office of Sheboygan, believed to be the first professional architectural firm in the City. The firm designed many commercial, institutional, industrial, and residential structures in the City, several of which are still standing and in use today. Included are two schools (one now City offices and one a day care center), at least two commercial buildings, a number of old factory buildings, and a number of private homes (among them the former T. M. Blackstock Homestead and the Friendship House, both Italian Villa style homes).

Arvin Weeks was born in the town of Chapaquiddick; on Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts in 1810. He came to Sheboygan in 1848, than an experienced architect and builder. His first ten years in the City were spent actively engaged in the practice of architecture. From 1858 to 1878 Mr. Weeks operated a number of sawmills and lumberyards in Sheboygan and Manitowoc Counties. After that time he returned to his former profession until his death at 78 years of age.

William C. Weeks, one of eleven children in the family of A. L. Weeks, was born in 1856. He studied architecture and building under the direction of his father, and later succeeded him in the business. The firm continues today as W. C. Weeks, Inc. headed by W. F. Weeks, Jr., son of W. F. Weeks, Sr., a nephew of W. C. Weeks.

Though no distinct architectural style is evident in the building's design, it is particularly noteworthy for excellence in craftsmanship and detail. Especially unique are the narrow brick joints and fine inlays of decorative terra-cotta over the entire facade.

At the west end is Firehouse No. 1 built in 1906 of the same brick and similar terra-cotta inlayed accent. In between are five 1870-1890 commercial buildings. All together they comprise an elegant downtown historic scene that exists nowhere else in the City.
