Rogers Hall is a rectangular, three-story Greek Revival mansion which faces southeast from the northern terminus of Court Street, thus commanding a view of the main street of the city. It was built by George Washington Foster between 1854 and 1855.

The house consists of three floors. The first floor is a basement above the ground, the second and third are the main living areas. is a full-length piazza on the front of the second story which is supported tiled entablature which supports a hipped roof. A broad flight of stone steps ascend to the portico. The capitals of the columns fair and dart design by an enclosed arcade. In the middle of the piazza is the portico which features four fluted Ionic columns rising from the porch to the broad densteps ascend to the portico. The capitals of the columns feature the egg

> The entrances on the second and third floors are recessed and feature side windows and flanking pilasters and a square transom. The third floor entrance gives access to a free-standing balcony. The windows on the second floor are sliding casement windows on the front and regular casement windows on the back. The windows on the west side of the second floor and of the third floor are six pane sash windows. The east wall of the second floor features two false windows which break the monotony of the solid brick wall.

The floor plan consists of two rooms on either side of a broad hall. On the second floor double parlors are on the right of the hall and two rooms separated by a small kitchen are on the left. The double parlors are separated by panelled, sliding doors. The floors are narrow hardwood The third floor duplicates this plan, but dressing and bath rooms separate the rooms here. The basement basically follows this same plan but has in recent years been divided into smaller rooms.

The second floor entrance hall features a broad center stairway rising to a landing where it divides into two flights to the third floor. The first floor is reached only from the outside.

Each of the second floor rooms has a marble mantel which is in keeping with the Greek Revival design. The chimneys are end interior.

The cornices, one of the building's most important features, are delicate plaster moldings of acanthus leaves and grapes, oak leaf and acorn clusters, and other designs.

The roof of Rogers Hall is hipped with a flat pinnacle which once bore a cupola.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

George Washington Foster was one of the wealthy planters of the Oakland Community, in the Colbert Reserve. He owned plantations in Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi. In the 1850's, when he wanted to build a town house, he chose the highest point in the downtown Florence area, the present northern terminus of Court Street. Because of the location, Foster had to obtain a special act of the Alabama State Legislature to close the street.

The house was probably begun in 1854 or 1855. In the 1920's, when it was being remodeled, a board was found signed "John Ballinger, Carpenter and Builder, August 24, 1855." Although Foster moved into the house sometime before 1860, some sources state the full original plans were never carried out because of the Civil War.

Mr. Foster engaged Hastings of Atlanta to landscape the gardens and the lawns.

According to the diary of Sarah Independence Foster, a daughter of Foster, troops from both the Union and Confederate armies camped on the grounds. On November 3, 1863, officers of the Union Army, under Sherman's command, stayed in the Foster home. A year later General Beauregard, General Forrest and General Stephen D. Lee visited the home. General Forrest and his wife and son, Lieutenant W. Forrest, spent several days with the Foster family.

In 1878 George Washington Foster died and the home passed to Sarah Independence Foster who married Sterling Payne MacDonald. He had been a Captain in the Confederate Army and had visited in the home several times during the Civil War. They lived in the home until 1900 when it was sold to Emmett O'Neal, a local lawyer.

In 1910 Emmett O'Neal was elected Governor of Alabama and the people of Florence formed a torch light parade which proceeded from the Courthouse to Courtview where they met the governor-elect on the porch. After leaving office in 1915, O'Neal made his home in Birmingham and the house in Florence was rented out as a boarding house.

When Governor O'Neal died, in 1922, Courtview was sold to Thomas

- M. Rogers, Sr. He and his wife remodeled and renovated the house and used it as their home until 1948 when Mrs. Rogers sold it to Florence State College. The college, now Florence State University, uses the home as a social center.

In 1935 Courtview was placed on the Historic American Buildings Survey. A description of its appearance was placed in the Library of Congress.
