On the level top of the monolith is a flagstone plaza forty feet by twenty-four feet surrounded by a one foot high manposte- ria wall eighteen inches thick. Between the plaza and the stone steps is an entranceway thirty feet long. On the bay side of the entranceway is the remains of a guard room ten feet by fifteen feet, six feet above the entranceway level.

Perched on a rock at the extreme northwest end of Umatac is the ruins of possibly the earliest known Spanish structure on Guam. Fort Santo Angel was probably the first of three forts built in Umatac by the Spanish for the protection of the Manila galleons, that sailed between Manila and Acapulco from 1568 to 1815, when they anchored in Umatac Bay for supplies and repairs.

Fort Santo Angel has been variously described by visitors to Guam. In 1742, Commodore Anson described Fort Santo Angel as the Castle of San Angelo with five eight-powders near the road where the Manila ship usually anchors. William Haswell mentioned the fortification in 1802 as having **six** guns with a lieutenant and twenty men. Thus, the fort was in use up until the end of the Manila galleons voyages.
