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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

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The Alna School is a small square building with a low hipped roof which is topped by a delicate Federal octagonal cupola. A small one story addition has been added to the rear in recent years to serve the needs of the Town Office, which this old building currently houses. The school is of frame construction on a granite and brick foundation. The exterior is covered in clapboards and features a projecting, simply molded cornice. The whole structure is painted white. The windows, of which there are eight in the original portion, are rectangular with sash hung in a twelve over eight fashion. There are two per side, and the front elevation features the addition of a door near the right hand corner.

The cupola, which is of a slightly later date than the original 1795 fabric, is the building's most distinguished feature. It adds an architectural quality to the small building and is well scaled with the school's simple proportions. It is an open structure with its corners marked with posts. Each of the eight openings has a railing across the bottom and is capped with shallow eliptical arches. Above is a projecting cornice below an octagonal, bell-shaped roof which is topped with a short spire.

The interior has been much altered, the original school furnishings having been removed. The chief interest of the building lies in its original exterior, the general form of which resembles that of a contemporary (1794) schoolhouse in Bath now destroyed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This small framestructure of 1795 with its graceful little cupola is the second oldest surviving one room schoolhouse in Maine. The oldest at York, dates from approximately fifty years earlier. A comparison of the two reveals the crudeness of the earlier and served to illustrate a change in the way of life and building practices in Maine during the latter half of the 18th century. The earlier structure is indicative of an uneasy, frontier-type existence where expediency determined form and style; while the later, the Alna School, reflects a secure and increasingly prosperous era after the Revolution when buildings became more refined and more architectural in pretention.

It was voted in May of 1795, scarcely a year after Alna's separation from Pownalborough and incorporation, to build two new schoolhouses to augment the one existing structure. The job was given to Moses Carlton and Samuel Averill, each to raise one building before September for a cost not exceeding 50 pounds. It is unclear as to which was actually responsible for the construction of this the surviving one of the pair.

The cupola was added a few years after the initial construction. The building served as a school well into the twentieth century but was remodeled somewhat a few years ago to accommodate the Alna Town Office which it continues to house.
