DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Glidden-Austin Block is a good example of a substantial mid-19th century commercial block. Its large scale and the power-ful simplicity of its Greek Revival lines have long made it a dominant landmark in the Maine coastal town of Newcastle.

The Block is rectangular is shape, measures forty-four feet by fifty feet, and stands three and a half stories high with a gable roof. The foundation is granite, while the remainder of the structure is brick with granite trim.

The facade, or east wall of the Glidden-Austin Block is symmetrically arranged with seven bays on the first story and five bays on the second and third stories. The first story bays are divided by a granite post and lintel system typical of Greek Revival commercial buildings. The central bay originally served as the entrance to the upper two stories, but it is now the principal doorway to the entire building. This doorway has a pair of doors with an overlight above them. The grouping of three bays on either side of the central entrance each originally constituted a shop unit with a doorway in the center flanked by two windows. Each of these units was remodelled at the turn of the century by replacing the doorway with a window of two-overtwo sash and enlarging the flanking shop windows to sixteen panes.

The facade contains five bays on the second and third stories. Each window has a granite sill and lintel as well as later two-overtwo sash. Above the third story windows is a Greek Revival brick cornice.

The left or south wall of the Glidden-Austin Block contains windows on each story. There are two small windows and a door on the foundation level. The first story has three windows with granite sills and lintels and later two-over-two sash. The second and third stories each have four windows with granite sills and lintels and origianl six-over-six sash. Two windows identical to these appear in the half story. The gabled roofline is emphasized by a Greek Revival brick cornice.

The right or north wall of the Block is similar to its southern counterpart. There are three windows on the first story, two of which have a granite sill and lintel. Of these, one retains its six-over-six sash, while the other has been converted into two-over-two sash, replaces a doorway. A granite string course runs between the first and second stories. The arrangement of the second, third, and half stories of the north wall is identical to that of the south wall.

The rear or west wall is composed of five bays on each of the three stories. Window treatment varies between six-over-six and two-over-two sash. Each window has a granite sill and lintel. The (See continuation sheet)

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7. Description

central bay of the first story contains a door with an overlight. This entrance is flanked by two windows on each side. The second and third stories each have a series of five symmetrically placed windows. Above the third story windows is a Greek Revival brick cornice identical to that on the facade.

The interior of the Glidden-Austin Block originally had two shops on the first floor and apartments on the second and third floors. The building is arranged in a central hall plan with front and rear stairs. An unusual flying staircase connects the front of the second and third stories. There are three principal rooms on each side of the hallway on all floors. Woodwork throughout the building is in a simple Greek Revival style. This includes four panel doors and triangular pediments over doorways, and windows. For the past twenty-five years, all of the Block has been open during summer months as a antique shop.

This impressive mid-nineteenth century business block was built in 1845 by Captain William Taylor Glidden, a sea captain and prominent shipping magnate. Born in Newcastle in 1805, Captain Glidden began at an early age a seafaring career which took him to Europe, Africa, China and other ports. In 1848, he formed a partnership with Hon. John M. S. Williams of Cambridge Massachusetts. The firm of Glidden and Williams owned a large fleet of ships which plied mainly between Boston and San Francisco beginning with the gold rush in 1849 and continuing until 1877.

Although spending his winters in Boston, Glidden maintained a summer home all his life in Newcastle and his continued interest in the town was manifested by his endowment of the Episcopal Church there in 1850.

Shortly after the construction of the Block, Algernon S/ Austin, also of Newcastle, became a partner of Glidden or at least a part owner of the building. Beginning life as a blacksmith, he rose in position and by 1846 was in the shipbuilding business. Between that year and 1854 he built and sold ships valued in excess of \$90,000. He also served his community as selectman and assessor for five years, was twice a representative to the state legislature and was the first president of the Newcastle Bank established in 1854. In 1859 he moved to Westport, Connecticut.

Although the record is unclear, it seems safe to assume, in view of the business interests of both men, that the building originally had some connection with maritime affairs. More than likely was in its early years a ship chandlery. Subsequently it has experienced many uses, being at different periods a garment factory, an undertaking parlor and a tenement.

The Glidden-Austin Block is listed in the Historic American Buildings Survey (No. ME-81). It stands as a focal point at the head of this once busy harbor of whose heritage it is so much a part
