### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Belknap House is a two story brick building with a one-story wing. The original two story section of the building has a low-pitched gable roof with its ridge parallel to the street. All openings are tall and narrow with simple stone lintels and sills. Windows are regularly spaced except that which appears above the left-of-center doorway. One shows what appears to be original louvered shutters. Side lights and a transom link the doorway with the Greek Revival style. Cast iron star clamps and simpler disc-like clamps appear on the side and rear walls of the earlier part of the structure. Also, although many of them have been removed, there is evidence of wooden roof brackets under the eaves. Modern additions on the exterior of this early portion are the front porch with iron posts and a rear frame porch or storage area at the basement level. The stone foundation of the structure has been cemented over. The original roofing material has been obscured by asphalt shingles. The brick walls are laid in common bond with header rows appearing after every eight stretchers.

In the interior there is little evidence of the original wall, window, and flooring materials and ceiling materials—window frames have been removed and replaced, the ceilings have been lowered—but few major changes in the floor plan have been made. Most of the fireplaces have been removed and blocked up, however. Only one original fireplace and mantel remains.

The one story addition to the west of the main block was constructed shortly after 1854. Its roof is single-pitched, however, but the windows are nearly the same in appearance, if a bit smaller, and an interesting panelling motif in wood appears just below the roof line on the front. Below this one story addition is a double garage obviously added in the 1930's or 1940's.

The Belknap House is in good condition and rests in a picturesque setting on a bluff overlooking the Mississippi River. Its front yard is steeply sloping necessitating the use of a steep flight of stone steps to reach the front entrance. The rear portion of the building slopes even more steeply allowing for a more exposed view of the basement area.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The historical importance of this property is clear: it was significant for being the principal residence of General William Worth Belknap during the most productive years of his remarkable military and political career. Belknap, a dashing and colorful figure of his day, derived his prominence from several sources:

- (1) Civil War military service, during which he quickly rose to the rank of Major General;
- (2) Appointment of cabinet rank as Secretary of War during the administration of President U. S. Grant;
- (3) Unsuccessful candidacy to the U. S. Senate in 1876, when the Iowa General Assembly elected Governor Kirkwood to the post;
- (4) Impeachment by the U. S. House of Representatives for improper conduct as Secretary of War.

This brick and wood house was built about 1854 by William W. Belknap as a residence for him and his mother, Anna C. Belknap, widow of Brigadier General William C. Belknap. William W. Belknap came to Keokuk in 1852 to practice law. As he was born and reared in the east and attended Princeton and Georgetown Universities, the rapidly growing community of Keokuk looked upon him with considerable respect and admiration. He enjoyed a prominent position among members of the Keokuk and Lee County Bar. He resided there until his appointment in 1869 to the cabinet of President Grant.

With the beginning of the Civil War Belknap helped organize a local militia known as the Keokuk City Rifles and rose to the position of Major in the unit. He volunteered his services to the Union, and soon became a staff officer with the Fifteenth Iowa Volunteers. He participated in a number of engagements, including the Battle of Atlanta where he was cited for bravery. By the end of the Civil War he had risen to the rank of Brevet Major General of Volunteers.

In 1869 President U. S. Grant selected General Belknap to be his Secretary of War. General Belknap served President Grant until 1876, when he was accused of improper conduct in office and impeached. Charged with selling army post traderships, his impeachment was not sustained by the U. S. Senate after a lengthy trial in spite of a majority opinion of guilt. Most of the senators who voted against impeachment declared they did so only because they believed there was a lack of jurisdiction inasmuch as General Belknap had resigned his office prior to the impeachment process. After impeachment General Belknap sold his property in Keokuk and achieved moderate success practicing law in Philadelphia and Washington.
