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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Arthur Larkin house is located in a rural environment about one-fourth mile south of Ellsworth. It is a large basically rectangular two-story structure with a full basement and an attic. The Renaissancestyle house faces north and measures approximately 65 feet long, 50 feet wide and 35 feet from grade to the roof peak. A cupola originally located at the north entry of the building rose an additional story.

The exterior walls are of native limestone cut into large rectilinear blocks. These blocks are dressed and laid in uniform horizontal courses. Projecting stone quoins accent each corner and provide a decorative touch to the facades. A horizontal belt course at the first floor line with a patent hammer finish and chiseled margins separates the upper stone work from the less sophisticated masonry of the foundation walls.

The roof form is essentially a hip with gable ends over wall offsets on the east, north and west sides. The roof is covered with wood shingles and overhangs the walls. The cornice is a broad curvilinear design rising gracefully above the stone. The gables are constructed of stone to match the walls and each contains a decorative window treatment, each unique in design. The north gable window has a rounded stone arch and decorative trim at the sides. The east gable contains two windows of the same design. The west gable window is in the palladian motif. The arched center window is flanked by two windows with flat lintels. Except for the basement half windows, the rest of the windows are long rectangles with pediment lintels, each carved with an intricate design. Carved stone roping and anchors flank each window on the first and second floors. Basement and attic windows are flanked by carved stone arrows or harpoons. These ornamental details give an elegant quality to the otherwise straightforward design.

Two large bay windows of frame construction on the east and north facades relieve the rectangularity of the building. Decorative cornices and articulated columns on the bays further accent their importance.

The present exterior appearance is nearly the same as the original. The cupola and the front porch have been removed, and an addition has been tacked on to the rear.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Arthur Larkin house, located just south of Ellsworth, was built in 1884-1885 for one of the area's pioneer businessmen.

Born in Dublin, Ireland, in 1832, Larkin came to New York in 1848. After serving in the Texas Rangers and the regular army, he was discharged at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, for medical reasons around 1861. He then opened a restaurant in Leavenworth and also operated a freighting line between that point and Denver. In 1866 he moved to Junction City where he operated the same type of businesses. In the spring of 1867 he moved to the town of Ellsworth, which had just been established. The Union Pacific Railway, Eastern Division, was at that time just a short distance from Ellsworth, and by mid-year the town had railroad service.

Larkin built and opened the town's first hotel in the fall of 1867, and in 1868 he opened a mercantile business. His first hotel burned in 1869 and he built the White House in 1872 and operated it until 1905. He constructed another hotel known as the American House in 1878.

In addition to his hotels and thriving business, he was a partner in the erection of Ellsworth's first flour mill and first elevator. He also owned a number of farms and raised horses and Hereford cattle. In the 1870's he was probably the wealthiest man in the community. Although primarily a businessman, he did participate in local politics, serving one term as county commissioner and another as county treasurer.

One of his farms consisted of 200 acres south of the Smoky Hill river, just south of the Ellsworth city limits. On May 1, 1884, the Ellsworth Reporter told its readers that "A. Larkin is completing his residence on the south side of the river. When finished it will be the most handsome residence in the vicinity." In April, 1885, he went East to obtain furnishings for the house, and by May, 1885, the family had moved into their new home.

The decorative stonework around the doors and windows was said to have been imported from England at a cost of \$12,000.

Larkin's house contained some features which were ahead of their time, at least for that part of the country. Natural gas wells on the property provided heat and light for the house. Larkin placed a gas burner in the cupola of the house, and the huge reflector behind the flame provided a glow which could be seen for miles.

The house was for many years a focal point of the community's social activities, and the Larkins were noted for their elegant parties.

Arthur Larkin was one of the leading figures of Ellsworth for more than 30 years and one of those responsible for the town's early economic growth and continuing prosperity. Because of his contributions to his community, his house merits National Register listing. Architecturally, the house is significant for the wealth of stone detailing it possesses.
