DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The date when Howell Edmund Jackson began his home is not documented. However, in Mrs. James E.Caldwell's book, <u>Historical and Beautiful Country</u> <u>Homes Near Nashville</u>, <u>Tennessee</u>, she states that the brick construction was completed in 1886. It remained within the Jackson family until 1944 when Mrs. Foskette Voss Brown purchased it and began alterations in the home.

The three story house, built of red, hand polished brick made on the place, with a foundation of native limestone, is of Victorian style with a high Vermont slate-covered Mansard roof. Pure white trimmings gleam from its numerous gables through luxurious foliage. A handsome stone fence stands as it did in the 1880's. Drives on each side approach the front of the mansion in semicircles.

The house contains nine rooms downstairs. The original area between the dining room and the kitchen was filled in and three bathrooms have recently been added. The second level contains eleven rooms and the third floor contains a ballroom, three storage areas, and a widow's walk. The house also contains a full basement which has a bathroom and a storage room.

The original structure has floors of red cedar and doors and woodwork of yellow poplar. The doors and woodwork were of a dark stain until 1944, when Mrs. Brown replaced some of the fireplace mantels with marble ones and painted the others white. White wainscoating and ceiling woodwork were also added by Mrs. Brown in 1944. The outside of the home was altered in that Mrs. Brown had much of the ironwork removed from the roof. She is now in the process of restoring the back porch.

One outstanding feature of the house is the sliding door system going into and connecting the two parlors. One of these doors is eight feet long. Also, the newell post is of a very elegant design. The arched windows were covered with louvered shades.

The only original outbuildings still existing are the brick smokehouse and the stone milkhouse. There had been a greenhouse, but it has been destroyed. The smokehouse is now being used for storage and the milkhouse as the caretaker's home. Both buildings are in excellent condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

West Meade, named because it was the Western portion of Belle Meade Plantation, was the home of Justice Howell Edmund Jackson and his wife, Mary Elizabeth Harding. Howell E. Jackson was a` United States Senator and a Supreme Court Justice during the administration of Grover Cleveland. Presidents Grover Cleveland, Theodore Roosevelt, and William Howard Taft visited in the home.

General W. G. Harding, who had inherited Belle Meade, gave 2,600 acres to his daughter, Mary Elizabeth, in 1880. Jackson built West Meade on this tract of land. The traditions of Belle Meade were continued at West Meade, including the retention of Belle Meade's interest in thoroughbreds.

In 1944, 1,750 acres of the tract were placed under three trustees, Harding A. Jackson, Will McAlister, and Dr. M. G. Buckner and formed the West Meade Farms Inc. This property was developed, and is today one of Nashville's finest residential areas. Five hundred acres were given for the creation of Percy Warner Park, and fifty acres were sold to Mrs. Foskette Voss Brown.

On being a part of Belle Meade, which in 1904 was America's oldest and largest thoroughbred farm, West Meade has significance in this area. It is also important because of its association with an important political figure, Howell E. Jackson. Its most important area of significance, however, is probably in the field of architecture, since it is one of the finest remaining examples of the elaborate Victorian mansions built in Nashville during the last part of the nineteenth century.
