DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a two-story, cream-colored brick house, built in the early 1850's in Italian Villa style. The main block is approximately square, three bays wide by three bays deep, although openings on the side elevations are not placed symmetrically. A single-story veranda extends across the front, with the roof supported by plain, square columns. At the rear is a two-stage wing, the first part being 1 1/2 stories with a hipped roof and the second, in tandem, one-

story with a gable roof and clapboard siding. The wing is part of the original construction.

Typical of the style are the low hipped roof of the main block with wide eaves supported by brackets. A large, square belvedere, also hip-roofed and having an arcade of six round-arched windows on each side, occupies the center of the roof. Window and door surrounds of the first floor and sides of the house are quite plain, but the three paired windows of the second story front facade are surmounted by bracket-supported entablatures, of which the middle one has an ornamental crest at the center. The upper central pair of windows are roundarched; all others are rectangular. Early illustrations of the house indicate that there were window shutters, ornamental iron cresting along the edge of the belvedere roof, and ornamentally carpentered porch columns and rails. The shutters and belvedere cresting no longer exist and the porch columns are now plain, square supporting members, but in all other respects the exterior of the house is essentially the same as when it was built. The interior has been altered to some extent but details are not known. The mason-contractor who constructed the house was Henry E. Roth.

The Taylor House, now a property of the County of Sheboygan, is leased on a 99-year basis to the Sheboygan County Historical Society and serves as its museum.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although it is a rather modest but distinctive example of Italian Villa styling, the David Taylor house is nominated not for architectural merit but as the surviving structure most closely associated with a historical person.

Born in New York State (1819), educated at Union College, Schenectady (B.A., 1841), and admitted to the New York bar (1844), David Taylor moved to Wisconsin in 1846, settling in Sheboygan where he established a law practice and was soon involved in local affairs and politics. In 1849 he was appointed to the Harbor Committee and became a member of the newly organized County Board of Supervisors. He won election to the State Assembly in 1853 and to the State Senate in 1855. From 1858-1869 he was prominent and popular as Circuit Judge of the 4th District. During this period, starting in 1858, he worked on revising the Statutes of Wisconsin, performing the task so capably that he was asked to repeat it in the 1870's. The result was a two-volume revision which became popularly known as "Taylor's Statutes." Taylor left Sheboygan in 1872 while again serving in the Senate, moved to Fond du Lac, and in 1878 was appointed to the State Supreme Court. He nevertheless returned to Sheboygan often and maintained contact with both friends and his house there. Re-elected to the state high court bench in 1888, he served on it until his death in 1891. The house he built and was so long associated with in Sheboygan remains a local landmark and is well maintained and in appropriate adaptive use as the museum of the Sheboygan County Historical Society.
