DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Newell Field Station occupies 360 acres of semi-arid lands in an area just north of the Black Hills and a mile and a half northeast of the city of Newell. It consists of nine structures that were used for either residences or agricultural buildings. Most of the structures have been unoccupied since 1973 when the United States Department of Agriculture closed the station. Since then only a caretaker has lived at the site. Therefore, the major change of the property is through neglect. A few of the major structures show signs of deterioration, and native grasses and weeds have reclaimed the once attractive farm yard.

Most of the buildings are one to one and one-half story tall with gable roofs and clapboard siding; however, other materials like asbestos shingles and stucco appear on individual structures. The latter covers an adobe walled house. The buildings are simple in design, lack ornamentation, and all but one are painted white. Upon entering the premises, there is a feeling of uniformity and that the station gradually grew to its present size.

The area nominated consists of the seven houses that surround the parade ground and the firehouse and the barn or shop building. Individual descriptions of the buildings are as follows:

- Building 1: This is the main office built in 1924; it has an L shape gable roof and clapboard facing.
- Building 2: The agronomist's cottage built in 1931 is a one and one-half story house with a gable roof and a screened porch.
- Building 3: This is the superintendent's cottage, built in 1917 with a gable roof, shed dormer and a screened porch.
- Building 5: The teamster cottage, built in 1938, is a one story building with asbestos shingles for facing, an enclosed entry and a gable roof.
- Building 6: This one story structure known as the adobe cottage was built in 1940. It has a stucco facing that covers adobe brick walls. It has a gable roof with the main entry at the central axis of the building's lengthwise side.
- Building 7: This 1920 bunk house is one and one-half stories tall with a gable roof, screened porch and shows damage from being struck by lightning.
- Building 8: The herdsman cottage, built in 1909, is also a one and one-half story dwelling with a gable roof and screened porch but it has an addition to its left side.
- Building 10: This 1926 barn-like structure was called the shop. It is two stories tall with an English gambrel roof, clapboard facing, and corrals are to the rear.
- Building 11: The 1926 Firehouse has a gable roof, clapboard facing and a small vehicle entry.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

South Dakota's most important business is agriculture; farms such as this one near Newell have enhanced its development through various experimental projects conducted there. Not only is the Newell farm significant agriculturally but also scientifically, as it relates to a systematic study of crops and livestock. For these reasons, and the hope to encourage the recent buyers to maintain and restore the historic appearance of the property, the site is submitted for nomination.

Although four of the nine buildings have construction dates newer than fifty years, the site still warrants consideration. First, the site is significant in the development of dryland farming and various other agricultural experiments. Second, because the program was successful and important, the Agriculture Department had new buildings constructed. Third, the structures are almost all similar in design to the older ones. Fourth, like prosperous farms, field stations must grow and change with the development of new trends in agriculture and the end result is new buildings.

The creation of this station began with the passage of the Reclamation Act of 1902 which helped establish the Belle Fourche Reclamation Project, one of the first of its type. Eventually, this led to the construction of the Belle Fourche Experiment Farm at Newell. In 1950 its name changed to Newell Irrigation and Dryland Field Station, and in 1957 it became Newell Field Station. This experimental farm closed in 1973, and a special education group purchased the area for the purpose of establishing a vocational school.

One of the main purposes of the station was to find through various methods and techniques, better ways to farm in semi-arid plain regions. Study of this type had not yet occurred but was desperately needed for parts of the country. Over the sixty-six years of operations, agronomists conducted various experiments on many agricultural subjects. Among the most important studies were shelter belts, various methods of irrigation and tillage, climate, soil-crop adaptation, wind erosion, and fertilizer. They also experimented with various crops such as flax, corn, alfalfa, wheat, and livestock. Overall, the project helped immensely in a large variety of fields and definitely is an important site for South Dakota agriculture. It also is significant to other farming areas that have a similar climate and soil.
