DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Odd Fellows Hall in Gary, South Dakota is an example of the type of commercial buildings constructed during the late 1800's in the Dakotas. The two-story brick building has a decorated cornice with a triangular attic centered on the top of the front (east) facade. Bricks protrude from the wall surface to make decorative patterns beneath the cornice.

Fenestration on the top floor features large rectangular double hung windows decorated with cut stone lintels and lugsills. A cut stone stringcourse runs beneath the linteled windows. The first floor has the usual plate glass extending the full width of the building's front.

The exterior of the Odd Fellow's Hall has not been subject to any major alterations. Like many buildings in this small town, it is in fair condition. Structures to the rear of and kitty-corner from it have been destroyed. Hopefully, a similar fate does not await this local landmark.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The I.O.O.F. Hall stands out as the most architecturally unique building on this small town's Main Street. Since its construction in 1898, the building has served as a gathering place not only for the fraternal organization that paid for its construction, but also for town meetings. One such meeting was held in the Odd Fellows Hall in January of 1900. Interested citizens of Gary gathered there to discuss the opening of the State School for the Blind at Gary.

Since its construction, the ground floor of the building has been the setting for various enterprises, including a museum and recreational hall.

The A. Oakes Company, of Springfield, Minnesota constructed the building, which today stands as one of a decreasing number of tangible examples of the type of architecture seen on turn of the century commercial buildings.

Building continues to be used as meeting place for many town organizations, acres (Huberman 4/2476 - telcon 4 J. Lille, SD)
