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7 DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on a paved road in rural east Topsham Center, the Chase House is a 2 1/2 story, wood frame building, approximately 35' x 20' of post and beam construction with a standing seam metal gabled-roof. Although undocumented, the building appears to date from the early 1830's. The main rectangular structure is three-bays wide, and four bays deep, with the gable-end oriented to the road. From the rear, a single-story, gable-roofed wood-frame ell, housing a modern kitchen, extends to the east. The walls of both buildings are covered with clapboards, the main building containing shuttered 12/6 windows, those in the ell 6/6, dating from a rebuilding of 1976 - 1977.

The main entrance, located on the westerly side of the house, is differentiated by its simple pilastered doorway containing a rectangular transom with leadedglazed side lights, executed in a Greek Revival-like style. Above the second story, a lunette complements the gable's symmetry, its roundness providing a softening touch, together with a shallow barge-board which trims the eaves around the entire roof.

The rear elevation of the main block contains an attic window, which together with the front lunette, provides the light source for the attic half story. The south elevation contains four bays of symmetrically placed windows, while the north elevation contains three window bays. A fourth bay is covered with clapboards.

A side hall plan, containing the main staircase, provides for an asymmetrical floor plan on the first and second stories of the house. The architectural components within the rooms are simple-unaltered trims, with the original pine floorboards. The main staircase, contained in the hall, retains most of its original newel posts, each post capped with a mushroom-line finial. The principal newel, in the entry hall, had been replaced, circa 1870's, providing for a contrasting victorian touch in an otherwise vernacular earlier 19th century interior.

Surrounding the staircase is a series of wall paintings, attributed to the itinerant American mural painter, Rufus Porter. The murals contain a variety of subjects with no apparent schematic plan as to their location. The murals, and their individual themes may be identified as follows:

Lower Stair Hall, - North Wall

- (1) West Portion (at foot of stairs), Landscape with Trees.
- (2) Center Portion (up the stairs), Landscape with Trees, a large Mountain, and a Waterfall (some area still covered with wallpaper).
- (3) Center Portion (below the stairs), Landscape & Mountain.
- (4) East Portion (behind the stairs), Landscape.

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8 SIGNIFICANCE

BUILDER/ARCHITECT

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The Chase House is significant in that it contains the only murals attributed to Rufus Porter thus far found in the State of Vermont. It is significant that the Porter murals are contained within a rural house that in itself shows the skills and talents of a local Vermont carpenter-builder.

Porter was born in West Boxford, Massachusetts in 1792 and worked as an itinerant wall painter in Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Maine prior to painting the Chase House murals, c. 1831-1834. This date has been suggested from a depiction on the lower north wall of the Frigate Potomac whose voyage around the world at this time was prominent news. Porter, the founder of Scientific American, was also interested in navigation improvements which probably accounts for the inclusion of the steamboat in the lower hall of the house.

The dating of the paintings around this time would suggest that they are contemporary with the architectural components of the house, of which the exact building date is thus far undocumented. It should be noted that while the carpenter-builder is unknown, the treatment of the newel posts of the staircase would suggest a local builder, perhaps from the Topsham area. The murals provide the perfect complexate ment for the vernacular building features, and when viewed by the side-lights of the doorway demonstrate the harmonious integration of the vernacular art of the painter, together with the craft of the carpenter-builder. As such, the Chase House may be viewed as a testimony to the integration of the less urban arts in America during the second quarter of the nineteenth century.

Her mission accomplished with a vengeance, the "Potomac" then sailed on "Round the World".)
(13) West Portion, Landscape with Trees and Mountains.

(14) South Portion, Landscape with Tree.

(15) North Poriton, Landscape with Trees.
