DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Mount Rose Elementary School was constructed in 1912 at a cost of \$1.18 per square foot for a total expense of \$39,743. The building consisted of 15 classrooms and a kitchen. The site was previously purchased in 1911 at a cost of \$7,500; a figure which acquired 3.28 acres. The deed is recorded as No. 2983, recorded March 28, 1911 in Book 39, page 91 of the Washoe County Recorder's Office.

In 1938, an addition of two (2) classrooms was added to the south side of the school.

When constructed in 1912, the site was a vacant field located on the periphery of a growing Reno. A photograph, dated circa 1913, shows the new school standing in the midst of an open field, surrounded by a rock rubble wall. In the intervening years, Reno has expanded greatly so that its borders extend far beyond the school site which now sets a short distance south of the downtown area.

General Architectural Description

<u>Plan</u>: Essentially a "Y" shape with a small wing on the south side; major axes aligned east-west and north-west. School faces Lander Street to the east. Basically symmetrical, the two major wings encompass a raised entry deck reached by ten risers. Originally, the entry space, which is unroofed, featured a central fountain; an item which has fallen into disuse.

Foundation - poured concrete Style - Mission Revival Structural - load-bearing (brick) walls Roof - gable over main wings; shed roof over entry arcade Overall Dimensions - 160' wide X 172' deep; one story high

Specific Architectural Description

Facade: Covering is cement stucco over brick.

Exterior Wall - Corners are captured by square columns which display a single recessed panel on each side. Columns are topped by domes with square bases. Column bases splay out from string course to ground. A pilaster, resembling the corner columns except for height and the absence of a recessed panel, is positioned in the middle of the wing wall ends on the east and west.

<u>Windows</u>: Square or rectangular, double-hung with a single light in each sash. Trim is very plain, taking the form of cement stucco applied over brick to provide stepped sills and broad panels at the jambs. Windows on east and west walls are topped with a projecting "awning" of curved tile set at a slope approximately that of the main roof.

Unglazed, round arched windows exist in each face of the twin "bell towers".

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, Mount Rose Elementary represents a rare example of Mission Revival Style in the Reno area. As an example of a style which was once common, Mt. Rose School stands as one of the largest examples of Mission Revival still standing and still employed in its original function.

Originally, four schools of similar design were built as a result of a 1910 bond issue; Mary S. Doten Elementary, Mount Rose Elementary, Orvis Ring Elementary, and McKinley Park Elementary. The Mary S. Doten School has been torn down. Orvis Ring and McKinley Park Schools are no longer in the Washoe School District; the former is currently being considered for demolition by the Reno City Council while the latter is serving as office space for the City. Only Mount Rose Elementary still remains as an educational facility.

Considerable public concern now manifests itself for the continued use and preservation of Mount Rose Elementary. Many citizens, alumni or not, have come to view the massive structure as a Reno landmark. Because of Mount Rose's relative high degree of integrity (compared to its sister schools) public awareness has centered on this building instead of the other two remaining structures. For this reason and in recognition of the school's symbol of the community's early recognition for the need for large, coordinated neighborhood schools, Mount Rose Elementary is nominated.

- <u>Doors</u>: In addition to recent metal clad doors designed to meet fire code, the school utilizes an arcade which shelters the main (east) entry. Arches are either round or elliptical. Ornamentation consists solely of a string course at the point where the arch springs from the piers.
- <u>Wall</u>: Ornamentation consists of the projecting ends of false vigas beams (these no longer remain), raised medallions of quadrafoil design and a horizontal panel located above the shed roof of the main entry.
- <u>Roof</u>: Roof over main wings is a gable of low pitch; roof over the entry is a shed roof which meets with the gable slope. Present and original roofs were of a composition make-up; no tile appears to have been used except over the square windows on the east and west facades. The dome roofs of the bell towers is now composition roofing painted with an aluminum coat. An early photograph (c. 1912) shows the tower roofs to be a different (lighter) color than the main roof; however, it may be simply a composition roof painted to match the stucco used elsewhere.

Changes in the school appearance have been few; largely in the form of an addition done in 1938. The style of the new south wing is very compatible with the original, differing only in the smallest details.
