DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Abbott Memorial Library in Dexter, Maine, designed by J. William Beal of Boston and built in 1894, is a well-executed example of the Renaissance Revival style. The building is one story tall and of brick construction with hipped roof (covered with slates), two internal brick chimneys mounted on the hips, and a granite foundation.

The north and south ends of the building are two bays wide, while an unobtrusive modern addition is attached to the rear (east side) of the library. Below each bay at ground level is a small rectangular window which provides light to the basement.

The facade, which faces west, is five bays wide. Here as elsewhere on the library the windows are framed in granite and are capped with entablatured lintels. Fenestration is one-over-two. The facade's central bay is the focus of the library's exterior and contains the entrance. This bay projects from the facade wall and is surmounted by a triangular denticulated pediment. Within this pediment are floral reliefs which flank a medallion. The entrance, which is covered with a semicircular arch supported by attached Ionic columns, is flanked by decorative wreaths in relief.

The cornice on all sides is denticulated and covers a granite frieze which is carved with swags and the inscribed names of eminent authors (Dante, Cervantes, Goethe, Auerbach, Shakespeare, Milton, LaFontaine, Hugo). Over the entrance the frieze is inscribed with the words "ABBOT MEMORIAL LIBRARY". All of the frieze inscriptions are carved in Roman epigraphic style.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This remarkably fine example of Renaissance Revival architecture is particularly notable in view of its location in a small rather remote industrial town in Maine.

Money for both the purchase of the land and the erection of the building was provided by George Amos Abbott, a leading figure in Dexter and owner of Amos Abbott and Co., a woolen mill founded by his father. The claim is made that this mill was the first of its kind in Maine.

Abbott contributed \$5,000 toward the purchase of the land and \$27,000 for the building which he deeded to the town for \$1. on Christmas Day, 1894. The generous gift was unanimously accepted by the community the following day.

Of passing interest is the fact that the only other building in Maine with a similar Renaissance open loggia is the Walker Art Gallery at Bowdoin College designed two years earlier by Standford White. It is tempting to think that J. William Beal, architect of the Abbott Library may have been influenced by White.
